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Google and I asked Charlie. Charlie said that yes, he looked at that map and he said he's been there, Charlie Park, and he said yes, he would say that what's written on that map has been done because he remembers they were working up here a long time. So he's really certain. But Roger Charlie was at work half the time, but he knew they were working up there, but Roger would know a little more.

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Art Donnelly (00:32:59):
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Wally had told me at one point early on that they spent a significant amount of money in the nineties replacing that chestnut line

Matt Ferkey (<u>00:33:08</u>):

And this would be the 1995 master master plan and then the installation. Oh, I don't know if there's, I have the book at my house and

Vanessa West (00:33:19):

I'm very frustrated. I really would've liked to have swapped that alder. I mean Maple, that maple line, it has its forest fix on it. I really wanted to repair that, but I was pretty much put down by Michelle from Business Oregon that we cannot spend no more money. And so I didn't bring it up to the board because Michelle's saying we can't spend no more money. So now that's where we just had another significant leak and the people were out of water and this and that. We just spent an arm and a leg patching it again when we patch it, it's not a cheap, it's like five to \$10,000 each time we patch it when it would only cost about 70,000 to replace the whole thing. So we've already spent half that patching. Okay,

Art Donnelly (00:34:08):

We have 800,000 waiting in the pipeline right now for line replacement. If we're doing less on Rice Road than we originally thinking, then we might want to go ahead and include that maple section.

Vanessa West (00:34:24):

We don't know.

Matt Ferkey (00:34:26):

We dug on rice and we found the first intersection of anything main on Rice Road is the fire hydrant at the corner of Chestnut and Rice. We use the back trucks. We dug a whole chestnut rice. Sorry, rice and first I'm thinking about chestnut. Thank you. So the corner, not president. That's fine by me. The corner of rice and first that first hydrant there, we used the back truck dug down and it is asbestos concrete. I'm so glad you did that there to there. So we know that there is a plastic pipe of some type down at the gas station,

Not of some type. We know that that is the service line because

Matt Ferkey (00:35:16):

We don't

Vanessa West (00:35:16):

Know. So we know and it's the right size. It's 10 or 12, whatever it's supposed to be. We know it's there.

Matt Ferkey (<u>00:35:21</u>):

My assumption would be that that at least goes from the tank if the end of river review to the post office, we have no way of knowing if it goes from Riverview to the post office. We also don't know if they did anything from the post office to the 90 degree turn at Rice Road.

Vanessa West (<u>00:35:37</u>):

I can tell you, I know it goes to the, we know that it goes from the end of Riverview to the post office because that line has been vacated

Matt Ferkey (<u>00:35:48</u>):

And that makes sense

Vanessa West (00:35:49):

Because so we know a hundred percent that line goes from there to there, at least post office. So we do know that for a fact.

Matt Ferkey (00:35:55):

So we don't know if it goes from the post office to Rice Road or up Rice

Vanessa West (<u>00:35:59</u>):

Road, but really what we found out is pretty much worthless because just because we saw the asbestos there and that it was still hooked up to, that means nothing because just like the old cat trail, they put in a new line but never vacated that one and moved

Art Donnelly (<u>00:36:22</u>):

Those over. This would raise the question.

Vanessa West (00:36:25):

So that pipe could still be there. We won't know until we start digging. That pipe could still be there just not being hooked up at the moment yet.

Art Donnelly (00:36:34):

Can I just ask real quick, isn't the leak detection equipment that you got sonic based? In other words,

Matt Ferkey (<u>00:36:41</u>):

It does not send out any signal. It is a microphone. A very, very sophisticated microphone. Yes.

Art Donnelly (<u>00:36:48</u>):

Okay. So if that line's been vacated, you're not going to hear any water in it. You're not going to hear water running

Matt Ferkey (00:36:54):

Inside. So the asbestos concrete line, a hundred percent has not been vacated?

Vanessa West (<u>00:36:59</u>):

Correct. Okay.

Matt Ferkey (<u>00:37:00</u>):

It's still in service. So what she's saying that there is a possibility that they ran the new line

Vanessa West (<u>00:37:05</u>):

And never, but they did

Matt Ferkey (00:37:06):

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Not tie in that hydrant to the new line

Vanessa West (00:37:09):

Or the other connections, just like they didn't do that. They didn't connect it on the cap trail. Those seven connections they had the new pipe in there. They did not put those connections on that new pipe.

Matt Ferkey (<u>00:37:20</u>):

And again, flip a coin for the same thing. When they did the repair, the first house on the left hand side of Rice Road, Aaron and Linda, when they did the repair of their corpse valve, which is on the main line, Mike says that, and I remember walking over there and looking and seeing that it, because I remember them talking about it, beam, asbestos, concrete. But Mike says that he is certain that it's asbestos concrete in the ground there. So again, neither evidence for either, but leaning towards that was not replaced.

Vanessa West (<u>00:37:56</u>):

I don't know that I'd lean, I'd still say 50 50 because just like that cat wrote, they laid the pipe but never attached it.

Art Donnelly (<u>00:38:03</u>):

The equipment, the one thing about getting the equipment for \$299 is kind of like a cell phone contract at this point. If you keep that equipment for 2 99, they want you to pay your service contract for six months. Otherwise they want to charge more. The counter to that is if we buy it, you can actually buy it for \$50 upfront and have 30 days to return it. I don't know if they give you the \$50 back, but they will return. There's no contract. The only contract is that they don't pay for six months that they might charge you full price for the equipment, which is 5 99. If you return the equipment, it's the \$50 possibly some return shipping. I just installed it at my house at noon today. I'm getting like 120 something plus megabytes per second of my view of the sky. I wonder if I have it on here yet. They do give you some amazing, I don't know if it would be on this or

Vanessa West (<u>00:45:24</u>):

Not. So you're getting 120 and I paid for 80 and I probably get 35 and I'm his neighbor.

Matt Ferkey (<u>00:45:35</u>):

Maybe he'll let you. Well, Larry, Larry is closer.

Vanessa West (<u>00:45:41</u>):

What do you have? CenturyLink.

Matt Ferkey (<u>00:45:43</u>):

Larry is closer. I mean you can see Larry's starlink from York. Well,

Vanessa West (<u>00:45:49</u>):

But you think it'll even work somewhere? You said you think it would work 50%. Do you really

Matt Ferkey (<u>00:45:55</u>):

Think? I actually think it might be more than that. So it's really hard to show, but since noon today, hundreds of satellites have passed over. I don't know if you want to, since actually one o'clock today. Hundreds upon hundreds of satellites have passed over. I actually think judging by that and judging by the picture that we have and by the picture that this expects to see, I think that we would have intermittent at least 45 minutes of every hour, if not more. And I actually think that it would still be fairly reliable. I think you might get some five minute breaks. So Matt, so that we don't spend too much more time on that right now, this is a decision that you can make with Vanessa and Jordan, I suppose. Are you proposing this as an intermittent solution until we restore our service with centrally or are you proposing this as an alternative?

Matt Ferkey (<u>00:46:54</u>):

I think that this could be either. I think that our contractor is begging us to have internet up there. I I think it could be temporary. I don't know how long until Hayak gets up there. I really would prefer that the water district does not spend any money getting CenturyLink back up there. Oh, I agree. I hate CenturyLink. Now also, there is not an alternative here that works a hundred percent of the time. If the starlink works, we pay for it for six months and Hayek comes up there, the equipment will probably actually retain most of its \$300 value because you got the \$200 discount for using it for six months. Again, the return option is there if it doesn't work. I mean even if we're out a hundred dollars, we have probably paid employees more than a hundred dollars in wages and mileage since the internet has been out. Just to communicate doubt, to verify things.

Rob Woodard believes, let me set some context for those of you who don't understand who Rob is. So Rob Woodard is the Lane County Special District's manager. To put it simply, it's his job to facilitate the interface between special districts

and Lane County government and everything. Rob has expressed over the last year and a half. A lot of dissatisfaction with how districts in unincorporated townships or areas in Lane County are supported by Lane County Government. The relationship that we have right now is extremely hands-off. It wasn't always that way until the late seventies. Lane County government actually ran special districts like this. They had local general managers, local operators.

## Art Donnelly (<u>00:54:32</u>):

They pulled out of that over liability concerns and completely cut loose all the special Well actually created special districts at that time. They weren't special districts before that. Rob has wanted, and one of a number of people working in Plain County in different capacities, who's wanted Plain County to rethink their relationship to special districts given all the problems that special districts in unincorporated areas are having. We're not alone in the kinds of problems that we're having, believe me. But Rob has come to the conclusion that there is no support on the county council to make this happen. So what Rob has dropped back to as a physician is we need to establish a relationship with Rainbow Water District, who I know nothing about except for whatever you may know if you've looked up their website online. So Rainbow actually runs their own district and they run districts for a number of other small communities on the fringes of Eugene and Springfield. They are interested in expanding and have expressed an interest in coming out and helping us manage this. I know nothing about the specifics. We would know nothing about the specifics unless we have some sort of information session. If this is anything that we would want to consider for the future, what we might think about doing is have a representative from Rainbow come out here and do a presentation. Alternatively, we might ask Rob Wooder to come out here and do a presentation because it's his idea.

## Vanessa West (<u>00:56:24</u>):

Me, Rob Woodard is great. I've got a cell phone. I can call him on a weekend if we have a mayday. I mean Rob has been amazing. I've been working with him with the Culver. But Lane County's direction and his guidance is come in, lane County can come in, take over Maple Water District, replace everything, 20 million loan, then they'll hire everybody to run it and everything and get it going. So it's top notch. Then that gets split by the 250 households have to pay that buck until that's all paid off, that \$2 million loan. Plus we also have to keep money away to be able to maintain it so that there's no way, and I told Rob, there's no way. There's no way. I said, Rob, I said, we're not going to agree on anything like that. I said, unless it's 18 million in grants and \$2 million loans we can do.

## Vanessa West (00:57:17):

I said, I don't expect not to put a penny in there, but I said, we cannot get 20 million in grants and we're not going to agree to anything that's going to be a hundred percent US loan. There's no way. It's not possible. Did we have an agreement or something with Rainbow? No, before, we've never had an agreement with Rainbow. So then there's Rainbow. So I already let him know and he's mentioned it three or four different times in a few different meetings. Oh, well we will fix everything and then you guys pay it. No. Are you guys going to help us get the grant? No. We can do with grants. We're not getting a \$20 million loan. So is that what Rainbow is about to So then his other option is Rainbow. Rainbow. Will they do? There's a place called Dexter, not Dexter, but something, I just looked it up.

## Vanessa West (<u>00:58:02</u>):

Oh, I think I took a picture of it. So there is a place, oh, my phone. I turned it off. So they manage it, but they do the billing for this one company. They hire up an operator to come and do the daily stuff or the DRC and they maintain everything mostly from a distance or they'll hire someone locally to come over here. But really the part that we need help with, we don't need to get rid of Jordan. We don't want 'em in the manager office. We don't want them to do the daily stuff. Sure. It'd be nice to have a DRC that has

some knowledge. That would be nice. More knowledge up to date knowledge not, but to have more. But then what they, and then grant support. So really if a just were a DRC for a reasonable price, which there's no way it's going to come close to what we're paying now, but reasonable. And then grant support using, Hey, you guys have grant support. We can use that piece. But really they want to manage the day-to-Day, the whole operations. And we just can't afford or need that. Yeah, like

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Art Donnelly (00:59:14):
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I said, it sounds like you actually have information. All I've heard

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Vanessa West (00:59:18):
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Is Rob. Rob is pushing for that repeatedly. And Kim told me, keep my eyes on him because it's not really him. His people are trying to, that's their idea. But to have Rainbow come here and sit down and tell us. Tell us and have Rob sit right here. And I will tell Ram and Rob that no, we are not getting a 20 million loan. Are you guys going to help us get grants and manage grants and get our system up and running up to par for a reasonable price? Maybe

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Matt Ferkey (<u>00:59:51</u>):
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It

Jordan Walker (<u>00:59:52</u>):

Might be good to have just more information.

Matt Ferkey (<u>00:59:54</u>):

It would be good to have more information.

Vanessa West (00:59:56):

Well more information, but they need to be here with more information. They

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Matt Ferkey (<u>00:59:59</u>):
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Need to come and do a presentation. I was going to say, I don't think that a private company is Rainbow Water District. Are they special district? I have no idea.

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Jordan Walker (<u>01:00:08</u>):
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It's a special

Matt Ferkey (01:00:09):

District. It is a special district.

Jordan Walker (<u>01:00:11</u>):

You

Matt Ferkey (01:00:11):

Do a really good job. When I look at business, I don't see somebody stepping in unless it's financially beneficial.

Vanessa West (01:00:24):

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They're stepping in not to help us. They're stepping in to make money.

Matt Ferkey (01:00:27):

Well the thing is

Vanessa West (01:00:28):

Rob tries to make it sound like they're coming in to help. No, they're coming in to expand their business and make more money.

Jordan Walker (01:00:34):

Not, not-for-profit organization, but assisting other communities does obviously for a fee reduce the cost to their

Matt Ferkey (<u>01:00:45</u>):

Users too. So two related questions to this. As a special district, I know the school district, they tax us, our property owners based on dealing within the district right now, we don't

Vanessa West (01:01:02):

Have anything like that. We'd have to get the voters to approve us, taxing them. And I don't see the voters wanting to approve for us to tax them plus pay their bill. Plus we're going to raise 'em no matter what. So I don't see it now. I

Matt Ferkey (01:01:14):

Know right now we have a lot of wells going in within the district. Yeah, 20 over the last couple of years. Yeah.

Vanessa West (01:01:22):

A lot of 'em aren't very good though.

Matt Ferkey (<u>01:01:25</u>):

No, they're not.

Vanessa West (<u>01:01:27</u>):

And I don't think anyone's disconnected besides maybe the one person that I had to block on my phone. She is.

Matt Ferkey (01:01:35):

Ask Lori how that's going. Two, I know that's quite a nightmare. Two. Two.

Jordan Walker (01:01:40):

And some of the people who have actually installed water are using the district as a backup just

Matt Ferkey (01:01:47):

To, oh see, I think Walton Walton is running off of his, well,

Jordan Walker (<u>01:01:50</u>):

Yeah, but they still have an active account with

Matt Ferkey (<u>01:01:54</u>):

Us. I think that Mandy and Zach. Yeah, man. And Zach.

Vanessa West (01:02:00):

And Zach just means we're going to have really No, that just means we're going to have less and less people to be forking at the bill. I've already asked Lane County for \$2 million, we can dig everyone a Well, they won't give us 2 million to dig. Well, because they like to have a backup plan. So they say there is no backup plan for a well. So they will give us 2 million to dig everyone a. Well, I already asked and the problem is again, yes, we just get less and less users. Well, and the thing is the rates will go up if only half of us have wells, you still have to maintain the entire distribution.

Yeah, I know my husband wants me to dig a well so I don't have to volunteer. I still debate digging a well. You'll dig a well, but like I said, I'm not going to, even though the rest of the community doesn't seem to care about themselves, I won't do that to the community that doesn't care about themselves.

So we pretty much exhausted that topic.

Vanessa West (01:02:59):

Yeah, some exhaustive. But I would like to, we could try to set up them coming for a meeting though, but I don't have to go to High Hope and I'd like us to really keep, when we do work with Lane County and them, let's make sure that we really keep our eyes open because I am not going to agree

Art Donnelly (01:03:17):

To proponent of this idea at all. It is the last case scenario.

Vanessa West (01:03:23):

It's an easy way for Lane County to fix this if we're not going to do rainbow water, let's get go on.

I will note that just one final note is that a lot of the districts that they help manage are quite a bit smaller than us. I think there might be one about our size, but I'm not sure if they would be willing to, I don't know their position would be,

An actual, what this is meant to avoid is putting out an open RFP and having everybody and getting 30 firms that respond to your RFP. And then you have to all of those guys submit actual proposals. Those are contract proposals and everything before you've had a chance to decide whether you want to work with any of them. If RFQ narrows your pool down to the firms that have the qualifications, you are looking for either a specific project or for an ongoing consulting engineer relationship. Okay, that makes sense. That's all it is. So that you've got a qualified pool of applicants then like say for the EPA or when you're ready to send out your rf, what they call an RFP, your request for a proposal on your construction project, you need an engineer of record. You're only going to send it out to the people that you've already qualified. So maybe you've got three qualified firms that you would really want to work with. They only have to send it out to 'em. It makes life an awful lot easier for us, an awful lot easier. That's all this step is about. Got it.

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Jordan Walker (01:15:50):
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So what would be the next step for

Art Donnelly (<u>01:15:52</u>):

Board action? We have an eight page form that we send out to the people that responded. They fill that out, they write their little essay questions, answers to the essay questions.

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Vanessa West (<u>01:16:04</u>):
And what does that
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Art Donnelly (01:16:05):

Do? Well, we blew past that, so no problem. Now I'm sure some of them are wondering, but come on, it's the holidays. So our next step would be to send that out to whoever answered. To, one of the things is I think we all know this, it would be nice, it would be important for us to be working with a company that's actually headquartered here in the state and as a local presence and local knowledge and people that are close enough in offices, they're boots on the ground to be able to come here, not rely on a distance relationship for almost everything. That's bullshit. Do we currently have an engineer of record or is that No, we don't have, right now our engineer of record on the existing active project that we have is West Coast. So you have to have an engineer of record on a project like that. Yeah, I mean Oregon Health Authority wouldn't allow you not to. Okay. Yeah, that's law. Yeah,

# Vanessa West (01:18:21):

And I would really like an engineer that might have more boots on the ground. So the west, it's been great, but they don't, even though they're local, they're not putting much boots on the ground.

# Art Donnelly (<u>01:18:30</u>):

West Jo has not been great, and we know that our experience over the last, my experience over the last year and a half has certainly shown me that West Jo has not the kind of engineering company that we'd want to be working with. West Jo does not have our best interests at heart while they're working for us, they have theirs. And that could be a look, everybody, every engineering firm that responds is going to have degrees and some completed projects that they can point to. They're going to be qualified to do the work. We're not just looking for an engineering firm that's qualified to do the work. We're looking for an engineering firm that's willing to put our interest first. It always works this way. Our interest first because they know that means they'll keep making money off us. And

#### Vanessa West (01:19:21):

A smaller, more local company, like a company from Newport's going to know that we are a low income and understand because we're pretty much their neighbors. It's a lot easier for someone from Colorado see as people,

### Art Donnelly (01:19:39):

For anybody in particular because I don't know very many engineering companies and there's got to be some really great ones out there to work with that we haven't had any experience with. But I do know one thing, and it's been interesting to see how this has worked out in practice. When Kevin sat down with Vanessa and I in there back in September of last year for that very first meeting, he said, we'll do the extras to help you out on stuff because we're making an investment. If we do that, it creates more work for us. He's not stupid. Now that could have been empty talk and I haven't been a hundred percent happy with everything, but what I have seen is that when I was having trouble getting that EPA application in and I expressed that problem, my frustration to Kevin on the phone call, Kevin said, no problem.

#### Art Donnelly (01:20:53):

I've been an employee who does this stuff all the time, Shannon, Joseph. He goes, here's her email unlimited hours. She'll help you get that done. She did. I would not have been able to get that in without

Shannon's help. He didn't have to do that. He didn't have to do that. This help that he's been given, we would not be over the hump with a FEMA one without Kevin's help. Kevin's help personally, he didn't have to do that. There is nothing in the master plan contract that would've obligated him to give us the help that he's been giving us anything in our current relationship. It would obligate him to be in on those internet meetings that we're having right now. But he always shows up. He always puts time in. That's the kind of engineering firm I want to be able to work with. You are. Well, we are, but not really. We are on one project, but not really. But the thing is, we are probably going to have to go after 10 to \$15 million plus grant opportunities over this next year.

## Art Donnelly (01:22:11):

There it is. No way in hell that's happened successfully. If you're lying on me by myself, not going to have, so I need somebody I can work with. So this goes a little above and beyond that RFP process, but it does point to one of the evaluator criteria we want use when we're looking at who we want to partner up with over the long term. The biggest argument that I'm going to make on that is this. We're depending on how many people show up at any given time. We're a pretty small group of people. Over half of us sitting here are volunteers. We don't have the capacity to manage multiple working on multiple projects simultaneously. We don't have the capacity to effectively more efficiently manage multiple RFP processes simultaneously over the next year or so. There's no God way we're going to be able to do that.

### Art Donnelly (01:23:27):

So if you compare notes, and this is one of the things that I did when I was talking to small districts back last year after Mark Newtson generated that list of people we haven't talked to see how they were managing their little districts with a little board and a lot of cases, no general manager and no certified operator, these kinds of things came up. Having one engineering company that you can work with over time has the advantage of familiarity, I guess is the best way to put it. Consistency. They learn how you work, you learn how they work. They start to be able to anticipate the kinds of things that you're going to be able to do. These guys are dealing with those federal grants every single day of the week, for instance, and I bet you we've got responses from a number of the firms on that list, but if you look up the top 15 civil engineering firms in headquartered Oregon, civil West is on that list, there's a reason,

Art Donnelly (<u>01:26:25</u>):

Well, I mean, okay, I don't know what's appropriate here because Matt's sitting here, but I feel like Matt reached out to the board with some legitimate concerns that he needed to have at least thoughtful responses on. I know I gave him a vaguely encouraging response as vague as I possibly could. Matt, as far as I'm concerned, is incredibly valuable part of the team and we really should as a team, talk about where we're going with that. The employee evaluation process is part of our response to Matt's concerns because employee, as it says in the employee handbook, the employee evaluation process is part of the review that would have to take place before we recommended any change in pay rate, for instance. So like I said, Matt, I mean, have you gotten what you consider to be a satisfactory response to your letter? From what I've heard, I think that it just needs to be considered. And again, if it's in the handbook that there are things, then yeah,

Vanessa West (01:27:51):

I would like to steppings stepping stones so we can know. So it's not just ask us every six months and we'll flip a coin and say yes or no. That's exactly right. If you get this and this and this like an evaluation and then this and kind of a stepping stone. So I think we need to work on the employee

evaluation policies. Then I think that we need to do individual for not just for Matt, but also for the position of taes, but then also the position for Jordan. I think all of our employees do need to know what needs to be done. You have to be able to, even if it's to climb up the ladder, you're talking about steps climbing up the ladder or even if every year you get a dollar raise, I mean whatever we want to make it be, there's got to be stepping stones and then ladders. And I think that we really do need to sit down and discuss those, but I don't think we're going to figure those out overnight. But you need to be active.

I have a question for you. Are you good with postponing this until we have

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Vanessa West (01:28:58):

And we actively, I'm good with that. Then actively work on it and I'll try to put some ideas together and maybe we could even kind of work together on one of our meetings.

Matt Ferkey (<u>01:29:08</u>):

So one of the things that was discussed in the letter that I sent out was things like either yesterday or day before we had a chlorine test just flat out failed. One of the pouches just failed. It didn't react at all. And so whereas a larger district might have a second employee that's already on duty for that there, and that leaves two things. That leaves the one operator saying, okay, what do I do? And then the other operator has to be involved. And so with only two operators, that's all you've got. So actually I think coverage for time off well, and that's it. I think I worked Saturday and Sunday and Monday and then I will go back and work rest of the week until next Saturday to avoid, and it was minimal stuff. I had to do a locate yesterday because it was past due, but with the holidays I figured, okay, I could go past due. There's another locate that I flat out didn't do, but it was with reason. There's a certain human need involved. That was probably brought up earlier and it's the locators request. Say no more. Yeah, it was 100% within private property. That's a problem where no water district line should be, and the water district lines that do exist are actually sticking out of the ground or have casings around 'em. So any damage to Mapleton water district lines based on that locate not being done would be pure negligence.

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Matt Ferkey (01:30:52):

Yeah, I think if probably in this case, if maybe Matt and Vanessa communicate with stuff and then Vanessa presents it to

Myself apparently

As well. Did you want one of these or

I will. So the only thing of note, I know Vanessa was concerned about our checking account balance. The
$100,000, almost a hundred thousand dollars was submitted the middle of last month and it should be

Art Donnelly (01:34:27):

All in favor? All in favor. Next is billing report.

Matt Ferkey (01:35:28):

Just on average?

Jordan Walker (01:35:29):

It's just on average. Another thing that could be happening is that it's just the billing cycle. I mean, we previously used to just read meters basically whenever we could, and then Kelsey would use the numbers, whereas we're doing it consistently on the 25th now, so that could monthly things in terms of collections. So month over month, past two past due total went down just \$200. Part of that was we got a \$1,000 account that paid late. Good job. So

Matt Ferkey (01:36:24):

Shutting off the water, they actually wanted pay. This is actually, it has an impact here.

Jordan Walker (<u>01:36:29</u>):

This was actually something separate. It wasn't our bigger accounts. It was just a paperwork error. In terms of the 90 days past due, we did get, which is I think is the more important kind of number because some people pay once every three months anyways, so that actually went down \$1,200, which is significant. And I sent out five shutoff notices last month, or actually a month prior. One paid their account in full or their past due. Now I should say three were actually shut off. One of those that were shut off paid their full past due amount. Two others or one other made a payment arrangement and a payment and then one made a payment arrangement. I need to follow up with them. And then one is still off. And they haven't used any water. They haven't used any

Matt Ferkey (01:37:29):

Water. Yeah. Do they have a Well, no, it's, they have a well, very specific address.

Jordan Walker (01:37:38):

If they did have a well, it would be an expensive well, which I don't think they would pay for. And that's all I have there.

Matt Ferkey (01:37:47):

It's an address where they probably don't love that they don't have water, but they probably have creative means to just bring in their own water or they don't care about having water.

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ShirleyMarie Raven (01:37:59):
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So the ones that were disconnected and paid and did blends, did that bring in a nice chunk of money

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Matt Ferkey (<u>01:38:08</u>):
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Or were they

Vanessa West (01:38:09):

Smaller balances?

Jordan Walker (01:38:11):

So there

Vanessa West (01:38:11):

Were thousands

Jordan Walker (01:38:12):

In terms of the past due amount that was about, so one account was close to a thousand dollars and then two others amounted to about \$500 in terms of bringing in past due amounts.

Vanessa West (01:38:30):

Okay. So that's pretty much the reduction in the overpass due

Jordan Walker (01:38:35):

Pretty much. We have people, like I said, pay every few months and they do make progress on past due amount.

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Matt Ferkey (01:38:45):
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I don't know if I'm up to date or not when they send the bill, if it comes with a late notice, I'm like, oh, I should probably pay that. Normally I get a picture of it from the post office and I pay it before I even get the bill in the mail. But it doesn't work with the new envelopes. It worked with the old postcards.

Vanessa West (01:39:02):

Oh, right.

Jordan Walker (<u>01:39:04</u>):

What doesn't work?

Matt Ferkey (01:39:06):

So the old postcards, the post office would take a picture of it as it was going through their machines and I would get a picture of it emailed and so I could pay it off of the email from post service. Now I actually have to basically open the envelope and look at it,

Vanessa West (<u>01:39:22</u>):

Email

Matt Ferkey (01:39:22):

You your bill. It's

Vanessa West (01:39:23):

Horrible.

Jordan Walker (01:39:24):

And then also I just want to know, we're probably not, I haven't really actually discussed this, Vanessa, but I don't think we're going to be shutting people off this month. He probably did send letters because only one of the three people I sent to actually received it by today. It was certified and I can't tell. And that person actually made a payment before they actually received it. So this month probably not going to do shut us, but next month.

Vanessa West (<u>01:39:49</u>):

Okay, good. Yeah, that's what I was going to ask you. And so I barely got that resolved

Matt Ferkey (01:39:58):

Related question. The house of Vanessa turned back on. Have you guys heard anything else from them about other issues or No? No. Cool. I was hoping that me turning off their water wouldn't piss them off.

Jordan Walker (<u>01:40:14</u>):

No, no. I mean when you give them so much warning, there's really nothing they can say.

Vanessa West (<u>01:40:23</u>):

They're actually nicer than have in the past. And when I turned it on, they were really good and then they gave me a hundred bucks last week to put on their bill, which I gave to Jordan to put on their daily and yeah, no, not bad. Yeah, they did it very well. Some risk management report. Looks like Jordan a really good job letting special districts know what we've been doing so they won't can us.

Art Donnelly (01:40:54):

So Jordan, I only have one question on that. Have we been getting any feedback from Troy Young or anybody else there?

Jordan Walker (01:41:03):

So he forwards all of our stuff to an underwriter, actually make the decision. He hasn't given us any negative, but he did quickly note that he liked the progress we made. I haven't heard anything negative and this report is actually very substantive when I started writing it. You don't realize how much goes on until you start writing it down. So I don't know. Do we have any, oh, one thing in the report is the maintenance for the tanks. That's kind of, that's a big project. Your hundred

Vanessa West (01:41:46):

50,000. We don't have the money. We just can't do

Jordan Walker (01:41:48):

It. Yeah. So I said that we're looking at the financing

Vanessa West (01:41:53):

And we can't do it. We'd love to do it. We can't do it. We leave a grant, we can,

Art Donnelly (<u>01:41:56</u>):

There's a couple of grant opportunities coming up that I would optimistically say we might be able to get funding to do that maintenance, but that operative word is the problem. Almost none of the grant tours want to fund routine maintenance. They will fund replacement. They will fund. They do not want to fund routine maintenance. Yeah,

Vanessa West (01:42:24):

They think it should have been taken care.

Art Donnelly (<u>01:42:26</u>):

Yeah. So it is difficult. There's one in particular though that I'd like to look at harder and see if there's, but what I'm going to need here soon is some figure,

Vanessa West (01:42:41):

Would it make sense to replace? No.

Art Donnelly (01:42:44):

No.

Jordan Walker (<u>01:42:45</u>):

Okay. What if we just knocked it down and asked for a

Art Donnelly (<u>01:42:47</u>):

Replace? I'll tell you what boy Matt, well know

Vanessa West (01:42:52):

3 million, two or 3 million instead of 250,000.

Art Donnelly (01:42:57):

Okay. Because then we have half the reserve that we've got right now where we actually need more than what we've got

Matt Ferkey (<u>01:43:03</u>):

Right now. So right now I try and stay above 80% of all times. If I turn this time of year, if I turn the skid off for 24 hours, we probably drop 15%. Basically I look at the last half of the tank as nonexistent. That's stay out of that zone. Absolutely. We're going to have an issue here when they want to do the tracer study because they will want to be able to produce at the maximum flow of our skid, which is 140 gallons per minute, which we can't do with the head pressure that we have. So

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Vanessa West (01:43:43):
We'll see. I can play with it. But yeah, I think that we really are making some good progress and I feel
like we're a lot less risky risk.
Art Donnelly (01:43:58):
Oh, I do too, for sure.
Vanessa West (01:44:01):
On several different directions.
Art Donnelly (01:44:03):
Yeah, 67% lost. The system is still puts us in a vulnerable position.
Matt Ferkey (01:44:09):
Absolutely.
Vanessa West (01:44:11):
Very much plant system update. That would be So that's the current, your daily operations plan update.
Art Donnelly (01:44:21):
Now can you just give us a real brief explanation of for instance, this last boil notice what's behind that
and
Matt Ferkey (01:44:31):
The last boil notice or the last public notice?
Art Donnelly (01:44:35):
Well, public notice, I guess is a better way
Matt Ferkey (01:44:37):
To put it
Vanessa West (01:44:38):
Because our boil notice we have one on Thursday for just an area because there was a leak.
Matt Ferkey (01:44:42):
So some of the
Art Donnelly (01:44:43):
Public notice is really what I meant.
Matt Ferkey (01:44:45):
Some of the public notices we're going to get, and this is one that's unfortunate, is just not having the
knowledge of order of operations of what causes what. So today I'm actually going to be going up and
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checking on the plant when we're done with this meeting. Technically chlorine is bad for humans. Okay? It's bad for humans, so you want to run the least amount that you can. Also, running less chlorine is not less effective to a certain point other than contact time. Because of our water treatment plant, because of how our distribution system is set up, we don't have a lot of contact time. A lot of water systems store their clean water in a huge tank. Well, our huge tank is on the wrong side of town, so it doesn't count. So one of the last ones that we had was equipment failure.

### Matt Ferkey (01:45:49):

I had already ordered the equipment. I had already requested that the board ordered the approved ordering the equipment. It was already on its way when I was bathing it and babysitting it and in the middle of the night it said, nope, I'm done. And we actually still continued. I came back and I even enhanced my procedures of every time anybody goes near or even including myself, you go push the bubbles through the system and flush them and make sure that it's not. So that one was that. Another one was we must maintain 0.2 parts per million residual chlorine. Well that kind of counteracts with contact time. One of them that is going to go out due by default is the skid was off for 12 hours. I took a chlorine test. Well, technically that chlorine had 12 hours of contact time. That water had 12 hours of contact time and the new stuff coming in would've had much more and it would've been higher concentration because it dropped due to contact time.

## Matt Ferkey (<u>01:46:59</u>):

We now have new procedures that you don't do a chlorine test unless you've been in production for 90 minutes and today today's chlorine test was a low number when it shouldn't have been Saturday's. Chlorine was 0.02, which would've been a double violation. Tasic contacted me, we went in and we verified via couple things that it was a complete failed test, a fresh test went right back on our same average that we've been running. But little things like that are going to cause things like that. And then the other one is just not knowing that, hey, you probably should not test unless you've been in production for 90 minutes.

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Art Donnelly (<u>01:47:40</u>):
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So educate me a little bit that reservoir, that below ground reservoir, I'm going to say behind the treatment plant and everything, what's the capacity of that

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Matt Ferkey (01:47:51):
Tank? 15,800 gallons.

Art Donnelly (01:47:53):
It's smaller than I thought then. So if we had a larger reservoir playing that role, that would be quite advantageous to us then.

Matt Ferkey (01:48:03):
So if,

Art Donnelly (01:48:04):
Is that called a Clearwater Reservoir?

Matt Ferkey (01:48:06):
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So it's referred to as a contact chamber or a clear Well, and a clear well is a filter source tank. Right? A contact chamber is a smaller, just that it's simply for contact time. So the contact chamber is internally baffled to make sure that there's no short circuiting. So it goes through and it is almost like 15,000 gallons of pipe.

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Art Donnelly (01:48:35):
Yeah, okay. I can kind of picture
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Matt Ferkey (<u>01:48:37</u>):
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And the goal is, is to make sure that you get that the most contact time, A lot of contact chambers, they have what's called baffling factor. Ours is above average and that's what allows us to stay in operation while maintaining 0.5 parts per million chlorine residual. Otherwise, we would probably have to be running more, running 1.5 and maintaining 1.5 to keep that contact time appropriate.

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Art Donnelly (<u>01:49:09</u>):
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So you know that we own another small chunk of property adjacent south of than adjacent to Yes. The treatment plant lease. Yes. And everything. Do you think that it is at all credible that an additional tank could be put there?

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Matt Ferkey (01:49:31):
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Matt Ferkey (01:49:58):

The only reason that I would add more would be as if there was a way to have 160 gallons. Any project less than that would be

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Art Donnelly (01:49:46):
The 160,

Matt Ferkey (01:49:48):
160,000. Yeah, sorry.

Art Donnelly (01:49:51):
Okay. So I can't even imagine putting that on that.

Matt Ferkey (01:49:54):
Yeah, so anything other than

Art Donnelly (01:49:56):
That triangle basically.
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Yeah. Anything other than that? Realistically just maintaining the higher required chlorine residual and having the employees trained to really know what they're basing that off of Jordan is or has created a chart based off of another chart that meets our requirements possibly. I need to discuss that with you, but what we're currently using and using for compliance, if the operators had access to that and some knowledge of the effects of pH temperature and our contact time, that would help avoid those. If we had a second pump, a second dosing pump and they were both providing half of our chlorine a required chlorine, if one of them had an issue but the other one didn't and we maintained a chlorine level, say 0.8,

we would still be at 0.4. Even if one of those failed, that would help. It's probably \$1,500 with our current system, our new skid, the new skid, we'll measure the chlorine going in, the chlorine coming out and it will have control over stopping the skid if it's not within the parameter. So the new skid will do a lot for that right there. The new skid should have the means to stop the skid if any of the compliance violations we've had occur. Yeah.

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Art Donnelly (<u>01:51:42</u>):
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Well good. I mean basically I feel a lot more confident in saying what I've been saying to a couple of people from Sherry, for instance, from Val's office. You don't query me about what's going on. And I say, Hey, it's nothing that's footner community in danger. No. This is more of a function of the skid that we've got right now and when the new treatment plant's done, we should largely solve these problems.

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Matt Ferkey (<u>01:52:06</u>):
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So something that I will say to anyone and everyone, small water districts, our water is cleaner and safer than a lot that I've seen based on the fact that we're running ultra filtration. We get 99.9% of everything out just by our filters, and then we do sanitize. Now, when that pump failed, we were not sanitizing, but there was still a residual in the lines during that.

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Art Donnelly (01:52:37):
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That's kind of what I figured too.

Matt Ferkey (01:52:39):

We'd

Art Donnelly (<u>01:52:40</u>):

Already have in the tank for instance, or the tanks.

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Matt Ferkey (01:52:44):
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And when we noticed that happened, we did back flush some of the low chlorine water onto the ground, actually technically to our lagoon, and it was low chlorine water and that's why we did it. So we back flushed some. So there was very little non-ST sanitized water that made it to our system with all of that. The previous notices, violations that we got were for pH. If you look at our pH numbers now compared to the pH numbers, then the pH numbers now with calibrated equipment, it's stable. It's running seven point. What's the lowest you think you've seen? 7.67. Isn't that also because it's a function of segmentation. So we have more problems with pH in the winter when we've got more organic matter in the raw water and that, I don't

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Vanessa West (01:53:36):
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Know, the pH meters, we just come on. It's creek water. Our pH is great. We've never had any, it is just that the pH meters were even calibrated. Were toast. That's all it was.

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Matt Ferkey (<u>01:53:46</u>):
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I have been told

Vanessa West (01:53:49):

Faulty equipment, faulty equipment and the previous, I don't trust a lot of all the previous tests. So who knows how long this equipment test been malfunctioning.

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Matt Ferkey (<u>01:54:01</u>):
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I pulled data logs off of the skit. If you compare those data logs, the information that coincides with our required logs that we keep track of, a lot of information on historical handwritten logs were wrong. It was just incorrect information. So who knows what was going on prior to nothing. We can make some guesses at it. Yeah,

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Vanessa West (01:54:31):
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I just don't trust any of the data that I had. I'm being

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Matt Ferkey (01:54:33):
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Very careful with my words, but since got, we were all reading between the lines since we got calibrated equipment, our pH has been great. Now we will not know until we get into winter what that effect is. The new skid will have equipment to correct pH. The new skid has that capability and we'll do that automatically. It will correct our pH if it needs it.

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Vanessa West (01:54:57):
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So we don't really need to spend Sure. We keep on getting these stupid letters. We got to mail out, but how much do we want to spend? We

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Matt Ferkey (<u>01:55:05</u>):
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Don't. No. I mean,

Vanessa West (<u>01:55:07</u>):

While we're waiting for another just few months for our skid to be here.

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Matt Ferkey (<u>01:55:12</u>):
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We're not putting anybody in danger. No, I am going to, when I leave the ski, the tanks are full. They're probably at 99.9% capacity right now. I'm going to go up there and I am going to check on the water treatment plant and make sure everything, because the chlorine numbers did lower a little bit. Now that could be water temperature, that could be organics in the water that's interacting with the chlorine. But I'm definitely going to check on that so that tomorrow when we do our compliance testing, we are compliant.

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Vanessa West (01:55:42):
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Okay, and when are you guys going to be taking in the samples for,

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Matt Ferkey (01:55:47):
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I was going to discuss that either tomorrow or Thursday during our meeting.

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Jordan Walker (01:55:54):
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Which samples are you talking about? The boil notice?

Vanessa West (01:55:58):

Yeah, the boil notices need to be ASAP. I know my daughter's taking my granddaughter to camp all week, so she's actually going to Eugene daily. Matt Ferkey (01:56:09): There's actually a slight possibility that a LG will be in town Vanessa West (01:56:13): Wednesdays. Matt Ferkey (01:56:14): Yeah, Vanessa West (01:56:15): A LG does come in town, I think Wednesdays and we've got to have it ready at like eight though. Matt Ferkey (01:56:21): I don't know if it's every other Wednesday or if it's every Wednesday. The first and the third Wednesday Vanessa West (01:56:29): And this is the second. But we can't wait that long to get people off by the Matt Ferkey (01:56:32): Water. No, I was going to bring it up at the employee meeting and possibly do it on Thursday, but if we want to do it sooner, I will and then we'll just do our compliant. Vanessa West (01:56:42): Then people would go, we wouldn't get our results back until Monday and that's not very acceptable. I wouldn't Matt Ferkey (01:56:48): Think. Okay. Then maybe I will Jordan Walker (01:56:51): Plan on it Matt Ferkey (01:56:51): Tomorrow. Yeah, I'll come in and talk with Jordan tomorrow. Vanessa West (01:56:54): I mean, I don't know. What do you guys think? I mean, I think Matt Ferkey (01:56:56): I'll come in and talk with Jordan tomorrow morning. We'll play. Are you in tomorrow morning? Yep. Okay.

Vanessa West (01:57:03): That brings up a question. How come you're in tomorrow morning? Jordan Walker (01:57:09): Just stuff. Vanessa West (01:57:13): And I could even actually go, I could just go. I could go and pick up my granddaughter from camp camping, go and drop it off Jordan Walker (01:57:19): As long as it's there before it's Vanessa West (01:57:22): Four. Yeah. I am working on an operations manual. I mean, realistically what it is, it has no pictures. It has words and we updated things like, hey, if you get an odd test, test again and little things. I do believe that it says don't test unless you've been in production for 90 minutes. Yeah, I think it does.

Vanessa West (01:58:37):

And that was tough. If you get a weird number test again, that was a little difficult for you. Well, because in some places it says if you test, you have to write that you've got to go to the lowest number you did. Well, what if you decided for five to take a hundred tests and one of 'em was way down here and the other ones were up here. You don't,

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And this would be the thing is you need to retest immediately or within reasonable timeframe. Because right now, if I go up there, if I go up there and test right now, the chlorine better be higher because the chlorine was turned up. So yeah. Okay.

And everything else is

Moving

For our treatment plant that we have right now that's moving along.
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Matt Ferkey (01:59:25):

Yeah, everything is good. And we are, I'm learning honestly, the testing. The testing is one that I have to learn a lot. And something that's weird for me is knocking on someone's door. That's an odd one for me. The other one is water. The other one is well, and especially I'm also the guy that has to walk inside their gates, turn off their water. If they don't, hey, so I'm the good guy, the bad guy, the other guy. The thing is, some of the testing I ask Oregon Health Authority, Hey, you want me to have this call form sampling plan? How do I do this? Well, here's the paperwork. I'm like, well, it doesn't tell me how to do it. And I'm running into a lot of that.

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Art Donnelly (<u>02:00:11</u>):
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Finding the Teresa is helpful and enough or do you feel like, because I know Dave's had health issues recently that have probably interfered you not getting what

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Matt Ferkey (02:00:22):
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You need. There are a lot of things I have found when I ask him. He says, I'll look into that. And I said, well, if you don't know, I'll look into it. And there are a lot of things that he says, I'll look into it and I respond. Well, if you don't know the answer, I'll look into it. Who's he? Dave, our DRC. So I think things have changed a lot in water treatment over the last, I'd say things have changed a lot in water treatment over the last year, the last five years. In the last 10 years exponentially. So I mean, the requirements of what you have to do have changed a lot. The fact that Reed's pork can still get away with having five NTU water in distribution is insane. We run, oh, we're running 0.015 right now. We are running clear water. Five NTU water. You cannot see through a gallon jut of water. That's gross. Our dirty water, our raw water

Is only about 2.3 even when
Matt Ferkey (<u>02:01:38</u>):
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It's not great. I drink straight from that street. No problem. Exactly. I like the filters and I like knowing that I'm not drinking live bugs.

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Vanessa West (02:01:50):
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I'm moving on to new update. We're just waiting for the building permit. We got the Waco unit there thanks to Matt. Really? Dan or guy or what's our, it's not Dan Tim from Bode Construction. He's ready to get his run shoes on as soon as the permits go through. We anticipate them in the next week and a half, two weeks, but he might be able to maybe start a week before that if he gets kind of a more firm date. But there's really, that's super exciting. We have successfully given all the answers and all of the clarification that FEMA requested that's been transmitted to OEM through Lane County. We've had innumerable meetings about it and good that we have Rachel at OEM who is basically our, they call it an interlocutor between Lane County is a sub applicant and us as a sub applicant says that we're good. So like I said in here, now we wait. We don't have any idea how along that period is because what we just did now goes into a file on somebody's desk in Washington DC Yeah, six to eight months. So once they get to that, look it over and decide they now have more questions, they'll get back to us. We don't have any kind of an idea right now of where we are time-wise, when we do have a very firm idea is that we have now cleared a hurdle.

#### Art Donnelly (02:06:03):

That means that this money is still ours. This money is still ours and we're still on track to get it. That's good. EPA, really, we're in the same situation there. I mean, if we drug our feet, we drug our feet and drug our feet, as I said, yes, the opportunity to put age out, we're not going to do that. That's not going to happen. So we have taken a small pause on the next two steps, one of which was the RFQ. It's not hurting us at all. We have had a little bit of a slowdown on a more time consuming step. Our next step is we have to create a work plan. We have to also have a schedule put together and we have to have a justified estimated budget put together. All of that's going to require quite a bit of input from the engineers at this point. We've got an engineer doing a master study for us, master plan for us who says that providing that kind of information to us is within the scope of the master plan. Thank God. So we didn't have to hire anybody to get that done.

Art Donnelly (02:07:21):

He's on vacation. But also too, we wanted to make sure that we had time to verify what was actually in the ground of Orford pipe. So we've taken that step. So we're good. We're good. It is important to understand that once we get the work plan with a schedule and budget put together, that's not an

immediate go to the next step, start hiring a contractor. We actually have to go through what's called an intergovernmental review process. So the intergovernmental review process means that we submit all that paperwork both to the EPA and to Lane County. They have six months to review it. Six months. I don't think it's going to take 'em that long, but Lane County would actually have six months if they are buried. Yeah, it could take 'em months. I don't think. This is why we're not going to be doing any breaking up ground.

# Art Donnelly (<u>02:08:24</u>):

We're putting in a new pipe until 2025. But that's to be expected. It's not going to slow us down that much. We've got a lot of other stuff going on right now. I, again, you guys probably already scanned this. This is the Oregon Department of Human Services Resilience hubs. Grants is a wonderful opportunity. The people in that office who were at the head of that grant process, encouraged everybody to put in multiple applications to increase your likelihood of getting at least one grant. We took that opportunity and we put in the three one per truck, one for basically a portable, it's like a little tiny portable skid water bottle filling tank, and it doesn't sound like much, but this is important, but 12 pallets of bottled water, 12 pallets, a bottle of water is an important thing to have stored someplace in the school. That said that we could store it up there. That's 15,000 if one of those comes through. Supposedly the bonus that you get is Oregon Department of Human Services will provide you with grant writing assistance. That's very poorly defined. Very poorly defined, but hey, I'm going to get, it's something. We also have an outstanding \$40,000 Community Foundation. Thank you. Operating funds Grant, 40,000 right now would be a great thing to get because that is an open check. We can use it for anything that we need to use it for operating fund wise.

Vanessa West (02:10:12):

I just saw an email that said that it's time, it's about time to the next one's open, but we can't apply for this one if we want that one.

Art Donnelly (<u>02:10:21</u>):

Actually, they're dragging their feet and I would anticipate that they're dragging their feet for exactly the same reason that ODHS is. ODHS received 700 applicants for applications. I would bet you that Oregon Community Foundation got equally flooded this year with applications.
