I'm going to move this closer, the voice recorder that way. Okay. Sure. I am Brittany Hornung. I am the accountant who has been engaged to prepare the proposed budget for the Mapleton Water District 2024. 2025 fiscal year.

Brittany Hornung (<u>00:26:44</u>):

Typically we just go down this line by line. So if you'll turn to page one, brief overview. Over on the right hand side you'll see proposed by budget officer for the coming 20 24, 20 25 year. Over on the left hand side you'll see the previously adopted budget, which is the one we are currently in, 23, 24 and two years of actual historical data. The first number that we generally look at is the available cash on hand line. One that represents the cash that we are estimating to have on hand at the beginning of the fiscal year. And we have calculated that figure to be \$96,345. Budgeted for interest. Income is \$600. Water revenue is

Jordan Walker (00:28:19):

budgeted to be \$256,950 connections. \$300. Miscellaneous \$1,000 IFA grant loan \$862,605. Backflow testing, \$700 ar RPA grant, \$629,713 and streetlight revenue \$10,050 for a total budget of 1,858,263. Any questions so far?

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I don't have a question, but I have an error of mine that I'd like to correct. The congressional grant,
800,000 needs to be moved over to the column on line 12. It just needs to be moved because it's existing.
Brittany Hornung (00:28:36):
It needs to be moved over
Jordan Walker (00:28:38):
To Yeah, because we have proposed it needs to be moved over to the, it needs to be proposed. It needs to
be to the proposed. Yeah, over.
Brittany Hornung (00:28:50):
Oh, we need to add

Brittany Hornung (00:28:53):
The budget this
Jordan Walker (00:28:53):
Year. It's existed. So it's rolling over.
Brittany Hornung (00:28:57):

Brittany Hornung (00:29:01):
Correct. Okav.
Jordan Walker (00:29:03):
So we'll need it.
Brittany Hornung (<u>00:29:05</u>):

Are you saying we've already spent that? We haven't spent any out of it. Well, it says 800 bucks.
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Brittany Hornung (00:29:17): You the Jordan Walker (00:29:17): Congressional grant, correct? Yes. So it's been allocated. We are in the process of being able to drop. So Brittany Hornung (00:29:26): You have not received any of those funds, Vanessa West (00:29:28): Correct? It is the EPA grant. I call it. I call it by the departments I work with for it. So yes, that one. We have not dropped any off. We do plan on using it this year. Brittany Hornung (00:29:40): Okay. Jordan Walker (00:29:43): 2.6. Brittany Hornung (00:29:46): So Jordan Walker (00:29:47): 1 8 5 3. Why is I asked Brittany to break that out this year. Keep track of how much we're bringing in is streetlight revenue versus how much we bank. So then is my understanding correct, it's not like we've got a new revenue source, we're just classifying it. Correct. Correct. Vanessa West (00:30:19): That way Vanessa West (00:30:19): We can tell people like we really do pay.

Brittany Hornung (00:30:28):

So our new total budget is going to be 2,658,000 2 63 with that additional \$800,000 on line 12. Moving on to page two, this summarizes totals that are shown later. So the first one we're going to look at, we're going to actually jump to page four to total personnel services.

Brittany Hornung (<u>00:31:07</u>):

Starting at the top of line one. Operations wages budgeted for \$52,400. Payroll taxes, \$10,000 workers' compensation, \$2,400, retirement, \$24,300. Administrative wages, \$33,670, unemployment, \$500 overtime, \$5,000 and wage dispute, \$17,004 with an FTE calculation of 1.5 for a total of \$145,274 in personnel services. Any questions on that? Okay, the next page is page five goes over materials and services starting at the top. Operating supplies line, one budgeted for \$12,000. Office supplies and billings, \$4,500, accounting, audit and budget, \$15,100. Legal, \$5,000 insurance and bond, \$7,000.

Miscellaneous, \$2,000 maintenance and repairs, \$20,000 power, \$10,000 permits and certification, 2,500, travel 2000, telephone 5,000 water samples, 4,000 rent, 4,200 backflow testing, 700 vehicle operations, 4,000 safety and security, 500 publications and elections. 800 street lighting, 12,000 dues, 1,200. Plant management services, 8,400, landscape maintenance, 500 billing program, 600 water system fuel 500 and software and IT services 12,000 for a total materials and services of \$134,500. So if you'll jump back to page two, are there any questions so far on materials and services?

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Connie Walton (00:33:19):
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Yeah, I got a question on that. The streetlight revenue is \$10,050, but we're paying 12,000. That's correct. That's all. Oh, okay. Oh, I was just sure. Okay. That's why I wanted to split it up so we can keep track. And then people, a lot of people think that we don't even pay for the lights, so it'd be helpful for everyone to see that difference. Do we have the option of increasing that monthly fee for people? We just have to vote on it, bring it up and then we have to vote. So that's what's going to get brought up as the meeting.

So I'm sorry, go ahead. Well, I do have a question on the personnel issues. Are we back on that? Sure. Well, we've got 1.5 people who is running it and are they certified? Where does that all stand? We're still paying A-D-R-C-I begged so many local DRCs. I begged and begged and begged and harassed them with their personal cell phone numbers that I got from other community members and begged and no, we couldn't find anyone. Luckily our DRC who oversees us though, he's only seven, \$800 a month when the previous one was 2,500 plus 10 or 20 hours a month at \$150 an hour and such. So we are saving a significant amount of money with Dave and free phone calls. So I think are you talking about the overall employment in terms of, or statuses? Right. So he's not a late employee. We need somebody obviously who's certified to run our district.

Just want to make sure all the, and I still don't understand this why it's saying 1.5 because we're, well the positions themselves, everybody employed is technically part-time, which is why it says 1.5. Even if the hours vary because we projected different levels of hours roughly year depending on, for instance, the new plan is probably going to take additional hours you say. Okay, so the 1.5 is just the bare minimum, but you accounted for the additional hours over the part-time in the wages, right? Correct. Okay.

they never once did. Actually, I'm going to give you kudos for what you did to make sure that they were caught for all the thefts and stuff around here. You kept on it and you made the arrest happen.

So then we got to give you and a mandatory boil water advisory just means you may or may not have anything. We have to test it and it has to come up clean and then we can tell you that you can drink it. It doesn't mean it's contaminated, it just means

There's a possibility and we have to test it and get the results back. Well and because when it's zero is not bad, but if it gets negative, it can suck. So if there's motor oil in the ground or other things, other things in the ground, it sucks in the, it creates a vacuum in the pipe. And then so it can,

Matt Ferkey (00:55:28):

The way that I like to look at, and I have this in my house, so my upstairs faucet and my downstairs faucet, if I touch a piece of food in my upstairs faucet and then both of those faucets get turned on at the same time, it's going to suck that food back into the lines and take it down to my basement faucet. Now in our distribution lines, that can happen too. We have backflow devices on most, so it's not a huge deal. But on a lot of our, well, we have backflow devices on most that require all the require backflow device. But in our neighborhood, if there are some houses that there's the two story house that's right across from where elite, technically, if that two story house has water upstairs and they have some contaminant, they turn on their line and it sucks a contaminant in that line and then somebody downstream from them, technically it could pull that liquid, our distribution lines. And that's a big portion of it is just that right there is that when we have no water pressure, there's nothing preventing stuff from the customer's lines pulled out. Yeah. Wow.

So are we anticipating that with this new amount that we will have the money we need to complete our project?

Vanessa West (01:09:14): Correct. Awesome. There's also money in there to pay. Jordan Walker (01:09:20): That's the award letter, Julie Doran-Lee (01:09:22): But this is what we're talking about or what We were just the contract. Correct. But for me to sign a contract, it's Jordan Walker (01:09:27): Just an award letter. It's not the actual Vanessa West (01:09:29): Contract. Okay. Your question again, why does it say it's a grant? We're going ShirleyMarie Raven (01:09:32): To have the money. It's a grant anticipated. It should Vanessa West (01:09:35): Say the 850 total. That includes even fencing. That includes our rental for the rental skid. That includes all the costs that we can think of that we're going to have, plus the cost of the contractors plus 10% contingency in here. So yeah, Matt Ferkey (01:09:55): It's the loan and we have the loan. Vanessa West (01:09:59): We just gave permission for me to sign the loan. We need to sign the form and then we don't have to borrow it though. If we don't have to pay anything on the loan, if we don't borrow it, we don't borrow it and it costs us nothing, but we just have to secure it at this time to move on with the project. Is that possible forgiveness, loan forgiveness, is that only for the 800,000 or is that for this total amount of our loan? That would only be for the 800,000. It's not a loan forgiveness, it's that we could just get someone else's money. So what we've already borrowed, there's no way to get forgiven that I know of, but we just won't have to borrow more to complete our project. We ShirleyMarie Raven (01:10:36): Would get an additional grant amount rather than have to hold the Vanessa West (01:10:40): Law. Correct. That's my understanding. Okay. Jordan Walker (01:10:45):

That sounds right.

Vanessa West (01:10:46):

Yeah, that was my understanding. So hopefully we'll have really good news in around August and I hear it's looking pretty good.

Sharon Kelly (<u>01:10:58</u>):

The only thing that would look good, that point would be up there operating.

Vanessa West (01:11:03):

Yeah, so that's been done. Ecwa grant update, the QUIA grant update. We

Jordan Walker (<u>01:11:14</u>):

Don't have any additional materials I can start. So we're in the process of meeting all the EEPs requirements, more like administrative requirements to have access to the money, including the anti-discrimination, but non-discrimination policies, which will probably be presented to the board next meeting. We don't have the amount

Vanessa West (01:11:38):

For the ecwa. This is an emergency grant for the intake.

Jordan Walker (<u>01:11:41</u>):

Oh, sorry.

Vanessa West (01:11:42):

Okay. Question for Yes. Okay. I was going to say, what do you know about this grant?

Jordan Walker (<u>01:11:48</u>):

You would

Vanessa West (01:11:49):

Information that? Okay, so this grant, we've been waiting since February for the engineers West Yos to, we completed the application and the environmental study got kicked back by the Fish and Wildlife in a couple other departments. We had to go through this long process. It is we had to hire an archeologist and go through the Fish and wildlife and so I did the easy part and got that part done. And then it was kind of more that they said it was more than what I could do myself. So we are having our engineer finish it up. It took them intel just, they still don't have the contract for me to review. So they've been finding the archeologist and getting the bid and still haven't put together the documents for me for us to sign yet since February. So it's like February, March, April, may. It's like three months just for them to hire an architect.

Vanessa West (01:12:46):

So everything's very slow going when it comes with them. But it does seem like from the email that I did get today, it seemed like in the next couple of weeks the archeologists will be coming out and doing some groundwork and the process will get going. But the longest time is reviewing the contracts and getting the bids and getting the engineer doing, I guess there's a lot of work they have to do and account for and make sure they get their money out of it. So that's where we've been. We turned in the complete application of everything that was asked for us. I think it was in December and it was in February when

we were told that we had to do additional stuff based on the criteria, which is a couple different birds that are up there. So that's, what else did

Sharon Kelly (01:13:27): We ask for

Vanessa West (<u>01:13:30</u>):

\$1 million And that will replace our intake line from the intake, the distribution line to our treatment plant, redo the road, replace the culvert, remove some dangerous trees and add some sort of barriers so that if a major slide does come down the canyon, that it's less likely to wipe out our treatment plan. So that's what this is. And this is a completely separate \$1 million emergency grant for hazard mitigation and the money will come fairly quick. Like I say, we've been working on this process, we just need to finish these last few little things that they're requesting and then we'll be able to hopefully get the started by August is kind of what the game plan is for this project. But we can't cut down the trees until mid-September because of the birds. So that's what the timeframe is. It's looking really good for us to get it. We just have to finish up with all these reports next, the Oregon Health Authority survey.

Matt Ferkey (01:14:37):

We are still waiting to hear back on that. I would assume that we expect to have some deficiencies. Well, I know we have some deficiencies, but they're all going to be correctable reasonably, I believe.

Vanessa West (01:14:51):

Okay. Every so many years we have to have the Oregon Health Authority, a hands-on go through our system and they've got a big checklist of all this stuff that they have to go through. We of course, didn't get perfect, but we did pretty well and they gave us some really good ideas of some additional little things that we can do to tweak. But yeah, overall it was a good meeting and more. And then it also helps because when we have a problem, we always notify the Oregon Health Authority and it helps for them to have a better idea of our system so they can help us. So we have a question. So

Matt Ferkey (01:15:26):

They are also possibly within the next year considering reducing our water treatment plant classification from a level two to a level one, which would potentially allow us easier access to finding a direct responsible charge because we'd only need a water treatment plant level one operator to run the plant without a separate DRC. One of the things that's taking into consideration is our water pH coming into the system, but they want a year of tracking that before they remove that.

Vanessa West (01:16:09):

And part of that was due to our pH monitor not being correct,

Matt Ferkey (01:16:14):

Correct. We don't currently have an operating first user pH monitor, so it's an employee's responsibility to go up there every day. Somebody has to go up there and check our chlorine and our pH and our water temperature. It's required by,

Sharon Kelly (01:16:31): Is there going to

Matt Ferkey (01:16:32):

Be a monitor on our new system? I don't know. We also have monitor equipment left over from our old previous system, possibly tied into the computer that used to be down there. And I'm working with our DRC with Amy, with Oregon Health Authority drinking water services and with the board to possibly get that monitoring hooked back up later on in this meeting we're going to discuss internet, so

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Vanessa West (01:17:05):
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Yeah, so we're hoping to get really neat things and some of 'em seem to be pretty doable and not cost a whole lot of money and be a huge benefit to us. Okay, so West Tech rental skid update

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Jordan Walker (01:17:24):
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We skipped, it's got pretty much related. It's going to help us. We're going to call the 40 survey event, the drinking water program violations.

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Vanessa West (01:17:32):
Oh,
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Matt Ferkey (01:17:34):

And it's very related.

Vanessa West (01:17:36):

Okay. That's why I skipped that one because you said Oregon Water Services, so I just went next.

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Matt Ferkey (<u>01:17:40</u>):
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Yeah, so that's regarding RPH. Dropping below, and of course this is for the public too. Our equipment that measured our pH said that our pH was low and instead of verifying the equipment, that information was what we had. That's what we provided to the state. So we The state approved it, didn't they? Well, so

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Vanessa West (01:18:07):
No, they flag
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Matt Ferkey (01:18:08):

It, the state does not approve or what happens is, is we report that information, the state and they say, Hey, you have a violation because you went below that. That was before I was hired on as an employee. We have multiple pH testing equipment now, which is pH and temperature. We also have more chlorine testing equipment on its way and we are looking into, again, the chlorine testing equipment from the previous skid, the previous treatment plant to be able to continuously monitor. It's just a matter of giving all the ducks in a row and making it happen. Are you talking about the previous skid for the plant before the one we're using now? Yes. The previous Skid had active pH monitoring, water temperature monitoring and chlorine residual monitoring. That equipment still exists, it's just a matter of figuring out the most reliable and cost effective way of making use of that equipment, which includes purchasing some items because like the chlorine residual monitor, it requires consumable replacement parts every six months to a year. Well that skit was taken out of service over three years ago, so that at a minimum would require to be purchased and before we make those purchases, we need to find out if that equipment would be, if it would gain us anything, if it would gain us compliance. So we don't want to dump money on it if it's just for looks and we need to make sure that we can use it, whether that be with internet adding more devices, the same device that we put up on our tank is A

Matt Ferkey (<u>01:19:59</u>):

PLC programmable Logic controller, but it's also, it's remote. So the device is \$800 and then the service is a hundred dollars a year. So there's potential, we could spend \$800 on the device, plug the pH meter, the chlorine meter and the water temp sensor into a cellular device that we have to pay \$800 for and pay a hundred dollars a year for services. And that device would send us by cell phone the information, the company that does it also records the information every half an hour we can program it to send us alerts if we go high or low. It's a work in progress and I've been an employee for still, I've been an employee for a month and three days. So we're just working on things. Is any of this going to be valuable to us when we get the new plant here? And that is another consideration is going through all of the paperwork of the new plant, making telephone calls and saying, Hey, do we need this? Will this benefit us when we put the new skid in? So that's another level of which direction to go.

Vanessa West (01:21:11):

I think it will because the skid is going to be the skid, but really it's the first user is what we need to know because by the time the skid makes the water, it goes through and it sits for two hours. So the chlorine, it doesn't go straight chlorinated water that just gets it chlorine. So it sits there for a while and then it goes to the first user. So I do believe that this won't be obsolete because this will give us the first user, which is the important thing. The skid will obviously give us the numbers here, but really what we need is the first user, which our treatment plant at the kitchen sink, we are the first user so we can do it from there. So I do believe it won't be obsolete with the new skid. Correct. Odds are,

Matt Ferkey (<u>01:21:49</u>):

Yeah, that's just a matter of what direction to proceed because if the new skid does have that, then you can't find out right now if it

Sharon Kelly (01:21:58):

Does or doesn't and we

Matt Ferkey (<u>01:21:59</u>):

Don't, I can call 'em. I could probably call 'em and if I get ahold of the engineer, yes. I can't call them right now

Vanessa West (<u>01:22:07</u>):

And our lead engineer was on vacation for a week. He just got back today, well a week and a day. He takes Fridays off also. So he took off that Friday and then the whole week it just came back today. And

Matt Ferkey (01:22:19):

Also one of the things that was discussed when I was hired on was that I had a lot of things that were going on in April and they're actually still going on now, but I have a lot of personal things that happen in spring. But you guys were without an operator at all until they hired me. We know,

Vanessa West (01:22:42):

But no, things take time and he's investigating, he's making his phone calls, but yeah, it wouldn't take but a 10 minute phone call, which he will be having. But those 10 minute phone calls cost money with our engineers at like \$300 an hour.

Matt Ferkey (01:22:55):

You said filter tech not

Vanessa West (01:22:57):

Right. Filter tech's free. Okay. So if you could just call filter tech instead of the engineer

Matt Ferkey (01:23:02):

Tech first, hopefully they can tell us

Vanessa West (01:23:04):

That. Yeah, that would be my best bet is start there because they're free. Okay, so that was violations. Oh, we are also getting more violations because we got it for the month before and this last month and it was all because the pH meter that Matt didn't realize until he caught it when he got hired on this month that Hey, what's going on here? How did it go low? Really? We kind of, Matt

Matt Ferkey (01:23:26):

Realized that as soon as it was his responsibility.

Vanessa West (<u>01:23:29</u>):

Correct. As soon as he got hired, he noticed it but then also found out the reasoning was because the pH meter wasn't working, but then he found what this is and Matt, so really we have to give out another one. Me, I'm hoping Jordan, that we can come up with some sort of, I just saw RE'S reports because their truity was 20 times what it was supposed to be and they had to send out a notice just like we did. Only theirs was actually that high, but it was not scary like ours, you may have lead in your water. We don't even have lead pipes. I mean I

Matt Ferkey (<u>01:24:04</u>):

Think that we're required to post that meeting,

Vanessa West (<u>01:24:06</u>):

But I don't know that maybe we can make our own. They seem to have their own heading and didn't have to have that exact wording. Sure. We probably have to have that wording somewhere down below in the fine print, but maybe a little bit more of an explanation and I mean we have the document that says, and I've got tons of emails where she says we just need to find a way to start off the letter finessing it a little bit and letting people know

Matt Ferkey (01:24:32):

It's not a big

Vanessa West (01:24:32):

Deal. And so that when it is a big deal, people will actually realize it's a big deal. We want people to know what it's that they deal matter what we say. There's just some in the community that will just see confus any issue as us failing

Matt Ferkey (01:24:45):

Again, there's nothing we can do about it. The way it's formatted, there is detail on it. You just have to read through it. Like it'll say if this was an emergency, it would've been notified immediately. But I'll

check with Amy and see if we can format it to where it's less. The worst, worst part about the notice is by the time that notice goes out, not water is long gone.

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Vanessa West (<u>01:25:10</u>):
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I know it was from beginning of last month, the two or three days, the pH was supposedly low when our pH runs high. So it's complete inaccurate numbers, but it was a previous employee and we can't, what can we do? But yeah, so just something so it's less scary so that when people do get something they need to be scared. They know the difference. Exactly.

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Matt Ferkey (01:25:36):
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If it was something like that, we'd be knocking on doors and posting it all over the place. Not sending, didn't have a mailer.

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Vanessa West (01:25:41):
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Yeah, waiting a month to send it out in the mailer. We have 30 days from the incident before we have to mail it out. So we will be getting one more notice for that and hopefully Matt's been here and doesn't anticipate anymore.

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Matt Ferkey (01:25:55):
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We're running eight to 8.6 pH. I don't see it dropping and if it drops, if it gets down below probably 7.4, I'm going to look and see what we can do. We do have the equipment to put soda ash a chemical into our water to make us compliant. It is more like baking soda. It's not a bad chemical, but it's just hilarious that if we drop to neutral or slightly below neutral that we have to add chemicals to our water to make it safer to drink.

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Vanessa West (01:26:28):
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And we've not used that in two and a half, three years that I know of. I don't believe that it's been used in way longer than that because our pH and our water, because I've been around for about two years, our pH has been great for this whole entire time. We've never had an issue. If anything, it was a little on the high end, which there is no high end. They allow the high to go as high as you want to the sky, it just can't go below.

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Matt Ferkey (01:26:50):
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I can dump ly, I can dump ly in the water supply and it's legal, but if I dump a little bit of vitamin C in there, it's against the lung.

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Vanessa West (01:27:01):
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So we had a problem where we didn't like it so high, but the health department doesn't care how high it gets. So that doesn't make sense.

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Matt Ferkey (01:27:10):
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Right now our water is the pH of what you would find in a store bought alkaline water, which is the newest phrase. So I'll check with him to see how much leeway we have in terms of the publication.

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Vanessa West (01:27:23):
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She did say to put in a description there saying that it was just a malfunctioning from our pH that we've got it alleviated do that. Yeah, but if you could put less of the other and more of the,

Sharon Kelly (01:27:36):

Did you do it as a personal line or did the water company put that water department put

Vanessa West (01:27:47):

That out? The water department was forced to put it out by Oregon Health Authority because that is, it was mandatory.

Matt Ferkey (<u>01:27:54</u>):

I would love for her to say that mid to water district does not have any lead in its

Vanessa West (01:28:01):

Lines. Well, and then also one thing,

Jordan Walker (01:28:05):

The theory, if people have lead service lines,

Vanessa West (01:28:08):

Which if they have lead service lines and some people do have lead service lines, their own lines, not ours,

Matt Ferkey (01:28:14):

But I mean it makes it known that it's not like it's contacting miles of lead line. And also, again, I would love to see our pH numbers posted if we had one day at seven and one day at 6.9 and technically a seven shouldn't do anything. Seven is neutral but

Vanessa West (01:28:35):

But then also I did talk to her about a year ago. I was getting so frustrated with all these different boil water advisories from all these different leaks and then we had to fix this one and shut these people off. This is and and the Oregon Health Authority, Amy, her recommendation was Vanessa, it would be a lot easier than, you wouldn't have to go take all these samples to get off all these boil water advisories. If you just did a permanent boil water advisory, which you could do for up to two years that if there was a problem, we wouldn't have to tell you because we're already under boil water advisory.

Matt Ferkey (<u>01:29:05</u>):

But we stopped to notify 'em with below pH.

Vanessa West (<u>01:29:08</u>):

But that's what she said. Well we would still, because that's

Matt Ferkey (<u>01:29:10</u>):

Actually don't boil. That's actually, yeah, don't boil your water

Vanessa West (01:29:14):

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Advisory. But that's what she said. So we don't have to do all these confusing boil advisories and boy water notices, which we've never had a bad water quality sample from the labs, but that was her recommendation and I don't like it. I'd like to be able to let people know if we do find something.

Matt Ferkey (01:29:34):

So exhibit item concentrated again. So the letter is there's no, there's no, to make

Vanessa West (01:29:47):

That kind of change. Okay. Did you print off what I gave you or no,

Matt Ferkey (01:29:52):

The West Bank?

Vanessa West (01:29:53):

Oh, I think I actually, I don't think I did send you the second one. I just figured. So West Tech, the great people that we rent our rental skid from for 10 grand a month that we've been renting for 40 months now. We paid 'em \$400,000. I was reviewing the contract a couple months ago and I looked in there and it's written like a high school reading level contract, which was very helpful, very simple, very straightforward. And when I read it, I could tell there's a try to buy option that says that a hundred percent of what we that at any time during this contract and up to six months after termination we can, this is a try to buy option. It didn't say how much the treatment plant was, so we had to work it out later, but which also meant you left out, that also meant all of our rental payments were going directly

Matt Ferkey (<u>01:30:46</u>):

To a hundred percent

Vanessa West (<u>01:30:47</u>):

Purchase of the equipment. A hundred percent. So I called West Tech boy, they were like, oh no, no, we're not even in contract. We've been out of contract for years. I'm like, no, there's no deadline on this contract and as long as we continue to pay you every month and you guys keep on emailing us about every six months asking us how much longer we're going to rent it for, but yet, no. So I asked the board if I can contact a lawyer. Lawyer agrees after I talked to West Tech twice. First the main guy and then the upper level and I actually also had Rob Woodyard and Jordan on the second call with West Tech and they said they weren't going to honor the contract with them. The contracts been done for a year. They just let us continue out of the kindness of their heart, let us just keep on giving 'em 10 grand and they just keep letting us keep the skit.

Vanessa West (01:31:41):

And then they said, okay, well if you do want to buy it though, then the original price is 620,000. Well, I do have the bid for new skids only 400 and something thousand and that comes with all filters and everything. We're only running half of the treatment plan. We had to pay \$150,000 for the filters and the other components ourselves. So this isn't even a full skid that we're running for 10 grand. They want to charge us more. They bid 300 and something for this news for this. So that is only worth 300 and something minus the a hundred hundred 50 we put into it. So it's definitely we paid for it. So I'm asking the board, I do have a letter here and it's called a demand letter. A demand letter, but they told me that it would be better. These people are wanting to play ball.

Vanessa West (01:32:32):

They weren't just backing down. They said, we want this, what do you want it for? We really want this and we're not letting it go is what they told me. So the lawyer said we can send a demand letter, but he recommends that in thinking it over, they believe it could be a strategic advantage to simply filling filing for arbitration before sending the demand a letter. By doing so, there's a better chance any arbitration would happen locally rather than in Utah or whatever their headquarters are located. That also means it's more likely Oregon law will apply, which might allow you to recoup attorney fees in any dispute. The main downside is the cost to file is \$3,500 and an additional 2,750 comes due if you don't resolve it quickly. Plus you never know how someone reacts to being sued. So they still recommend that we file for arbitration before they do because it sounds like they already told me they're not giving up easy.

Vanessa West (01:33:36):

It would make more sense to have it here. They think we were just, yeah, they did offer us two free rents months of rental service. We sent 'em a check real quickly. So I'm asking the board, what do you think? I called and asked, I emailed Spencer from special districts, their legal team. I asked him his recommendation. He says, I gave him all the information and he said, go with your lawyer. What are you paying him for? Your lawyer knows best, so go with the recommendations of your lawyer, which means if I wrote you, I would do the arbitration just to make sure it's here locally in Oregon and that's double less likely that they will file for arbitration and they'll take us more seriously. I agree. I think we should follow the lawyer's recommendation, need an authorization. I would like you guys to allow me to proceed to file for arbitration and sign the documents and mail off this demand letter.

Vanessa West (01:34:33):

As long as it doesn't cost us any money. Everything cost us money. That's what she just said. It will cost us \$3,000 in filing fees and another 2000 some odd dollars. It takes longer letter. So what she was saying to file for arbitration, so if we sue them before they sue us, we can keep it here in Oregon and Oregon's jurisdiction and their laws and yes, it costs money. So I'm asking for, it'll be about 300, 3,500 to file it. I've already paid for and got board permission last month for this to have the demand letter written. And then the 3,500 does not include the lawyer fees. This is just the filing cost. So I'm asking to file to not only send off this demand letter but to also start the process and for the arbitration. So then I make a motion that we approve for Vanessa to be able to be authorized to have this demand letter sent and to proceed with the attorney so that we can proceed into arbitration and whatever other requirements that will, how much is this

Matt Ferkey (01:35:52):

Cost, this

Vanessa West (01:35:54):

3,500 just to file for arbitration? I don't have a clue how many hours the lawyer's going to need to put on for the paperwork technic. And then he said if we file for arbitration and kept it in Oregon, we then could have them, we could recoup our attorney's fees from them.

Matt Ferkey (01:36:09):

So technically if they file for arbitration and send the demand letter, west Tech could say, no thank you. We know you own it and they could walk away just like that. So it could potentially cost very little less than the \$3,500 because if they know that their contract says that it's ours, they might take that arbitration seriously and say, okay, it's yours or they can fight it. But if they fight it, it has to happen their They're just saying to keep milking us, aren't they?

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Vanessa West (01:36:36):
Until we get this resolved. Yeah, I don't want to pay the 10 grand for this month and I'm going to ask the
lawyer if we have pay every month, we keep it. If we don't resolve this, we're paying 10 grand a month in
rental fees. But in addition to that, if we don't keep it, they're going to charge us for sending it back to
them. We have to pay
Matt Ferkey (01:36:53):
Shipping to send it back
Vanessa West (01:36:55):
And any damage we have to pay them for any damaged equipment too. Yep. They
Sharon Kelly (01:37:00):
Probably say we ruined it.
Vanessa West (01:37:02):
Yep. They're not nice
Matt Ferkey (01:37:04):
And it is still compliant. The equipment is still up to Oregon's standards today and we are always looking
into second things. If something happens to the filter tech ski, this ski is still compliant. I second the
motion Julie's motion. Alright, so that's the second. Now there's the
Vanessa West (01:37:23):
Opposed All in favor. Okay then I will let 'em know tomorrow.
Matt Ferkey (<u>01:37:31</u>):
Do
Vanessa West (01:37:31):
Thank you. Have you mailed them the check yet for this month?
Jordan Walker (01:37:36):
We usually receive an invoice. I'll probably receive.
Vanessa West (01:37:40):

Matt Ferkey (<u>01:38:05</u>):

Trust me, I've said that a million times. Okay. Sorry. Oh yeah, yeah.

Vanessa West (<u>01:38:09</u>):

Oh, I'd like to keep this one, but we can't already have the other one made at this point. Keeping that other one that we've got just as a backup,

Matt Ferkey (01:38:17):

Backup,

Vanessa West (01:38:18):

Paying the money to take them to court to sue to

Matt Ferkey (01:38:21):

Keep

Julie Doran-Lee (01:38:21):

It is going to cost us less than packing it up and shipping it back to them

Matt Ferkey (<u>01:38:26</u>):

And definitely less in the next six months of

Vanessa West (01:38:27):

Rental. And we've got about six months left of five to six months of rental then backup. So 50, 60,000. So it's worth it just to not have to pay the rental until the new skids up.

Sharon Kelly (<u>01:38:37</u>):

Yeah, that'd be good thing. Yeah. What about the demand letter prepared by Alexandra Kelser?

Julie Doran-Lee (01:38:43):

That's what we approved. That's our lawyer.

Sharon Kelly (01:38:46):

Oh, okay. Well I didn't know that.

Vanessa West (01:38:48):

Yeah, that's our lawyer for this. We had a different lawyer for the wage dispute in the same company, but this is one that specializes in this type. I've actually worked with this person. He's done some good real estate work

ShirleyMarie Raven (01:38:59):

For me. Alexandra,

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Vanessa West (01:39:05):

She works with Pablo, which is who I usually work with. So they're partners. So yes, so this was his assistant that wrote this up. I haven't met her, but the one I deal with is Pablo.

ShirleyMarie Raven (01:39:18):

Okay.

Vanessa West (01:39:20):

So yes, that's exciting. I think it's very exciting news with the West Tech, the master plan,

Vanessa West (<u>01:39:30</u>):

It costs \$86,000. Oh boy, we really need this master plan. I don't know how helpful it's going to be for anything besides, it's going to be very helpful for grants. In fact, we cannot write any big grants without this master plan. That's why there was less grants written last year was because we not only in order to submit for these big government fund, these big government grants, you have to have a master plan. You got to have engineering studies for each little thing. You have to have environmental studies, you have to have feasibility studies and really without a master plan, they had nowhere to start to do any of these. So this master plan is pretty cool. They're asking for us to give them more information. They're not really doing much on the ground. They're really asking for us to give information, which we don't have a whole lot of. So I was kind of hoping for a little more of their boots on the ground, especially since they're pretty local Newport area, but they anticipate in the next couple months they'll have it far enough along that we could at least start guiding them on directions to be able to start writing some grant applications with them and before it's got a hundred percent finalized, they can start helping us and getting some grants. What page

Matt Ferkey (01:40:41):

Are you on? Now they're going to tell us that we need replace our 70-year-old distribution system.

Vanessa West (01:40:47):

Correct. But see it's one thing. It's one thing for me to go and tell the state reps and to go and tell everybody in the world that our lines are 75 years old, they're old, they're deteriorating and they're not going to get any sturdier than it is for an \$86,000 report that says that they want it this, they demand it. So for us to get grant money, they won't just take my word on it. They were put in this year, here's the documentation that says the year. They won't just take my word and they also want to know for me to say it's 15, \$20 million means nothing they want, the engineer will also, the master plan will have a good value. So we can just use those values and go straight for the grants. And we are working with a lot of different government agencies, art and I and some are split up here and there, but I mean we're meeting so many government agencies on Zoom meetings. There's like 20 of us every month and a lot of us are emailing and stuff and following up throughout the whole entire month. So it's pretty cool.

Jordan Walker (01:41:56):

Did you mention that we're expecting a report or an abbreviated report within a month is what Kevin said on

Vanessa West (01:42:03):

Friday, a month or two he said depends on how quickly get him the information.

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Jordan Walker (01:42:09):
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Yeah, he said three weeks. He said a month.

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Vanessa West (01:42:12):
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Okay. Is

Sharon Kelly (<u>01:42:13</u>):

This on the master plan? Yeah, but it's on the full master plan. It's just to get us started on potentially for the beginning of grant applications.

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Vanessa West (<u>01:42:21</u>):
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Correct.

ShirleyMarie Raven (01:42:24):

So this is on the agenda just to give us information. You're not needing any

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Vanessa West (<u>01:42:28</u>):
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Action at this point? No action. Just giving everybody an update so they can know where we're at. Next is WTP Internet access.

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Sharon Kelly (01:42:42):
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Who's WTP Water Treatment Plant?

Vanessa West (01:42:45):

I didn't know either. tp

Jordan Walker (01:42:54):

Well, when did we cease having internet access? So during the railroad operations, some of the equipment came through and cut the line, our line. So our CenturyLink line was never approved. I don't know what the internet was before that CenturyLink line, but the CenturyLink line going across to the water treatment plant was never authorized by higher ups, a CenturyLink or by the railroad. So technically that line was trespassing across the train tracks. So when their equipment came through and cut it, it was our fault not theirs. Technically, if it damaged their equipment, we probably could have been held liable for that or CenturyLink.

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Vanessa West (01:43:37):
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So they say we don't know for certain because we've been having our phone and our internet, our phone up there for many, many years. So it should be grandfather in.

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Matt Ferkey (01:43:44):
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So they cut the line. We were still in the transition of me being a newer employee and of dealing with repercussions from the theft. I twisted the lines back together. Well the problem is, is the equipment that they have been running through is more serious equipment. The first equipment had something to do with the railroad ties. The new equipment that they're running through right now is like a giant motor tiller blade that runs this far from the tracks and I feel like if it grabbed the lines, pulled it up on there, wrapped

around it, that they're going to charge somebody for the repair of that equipment and it's going to take the foam line,

Vanessa West (<u>01:44:17</u>):

Our

Matt Ferkey (01:44:18):

Building, rip it out of our building and rip it out of Century Links box. Which then again, could somebody blame us for that? I have no idea. But we do not have internet up there and currently nobody wants to provide internet up there without, so the local technician last Wednesday basically said that he can't provide service there through the railroad tracks as it is. And he referred us to an engineer. I left a message on Friday. I heard back it sounds like

Vanessa West (01:44:50):

I contacted the railroad station and they said we have no problem with it being there. If I were to tell CenturyLink to take something out, then if we did the railroad it would've been me. And she goes, I haven't heard anything about it. So we did not tell CenturyLink that. So CenturyLink took it upon themselves to do this is what it sounded like. But she's going to follow up. I also had a lady that we have meetings with that I speak to several times a month. She's from Tina Coex, the congress lady from her office. She also called the railroad and she's checking in with CenturyLink because yeah, we do need service. So we're hopefully we will get this worked out because it should be grandfathered in because it's been there for many, many years.

Jordan Walker (01:45:36):

It sounds like there's more internal back and forth between CenturyLink and the railroad. The railroad we're just kind of t, so that's what

Vanessa West (01:45:45):

It, yeah, so we're waiting for them to work it out, but luckily we have government officials and it's not just from her office. There was three other that I have been emailing that's kind of along with this. So I've got from three or four different government agencies that are on this also so that we could try to Lane County Public Works. I can't even think of all these government stuff. So I'm feeling really hopeful. Jordan also checked with starlink and it sounds like out of a one to 10 and 10 being the worst, no service, we're like a 10 mike, so that's not really an option. Right

Sharon Kelly (01:46:22):

Star there with all the trees. Yeah,

Vanessa West (01:46:26):

Exactly. And then we don't have cell service. So like Matt's saying about getting that new app so we can see those things. It takes a cell tower. Well if we had internet we could connect to the internet, but we don't have cell service.

Matt Ferkey (<u>01:46:39</u>):

That's something that we discussed later. But we have intermittent cell service and that device has a remote antenna. So again, we could possibly put a better antenna on that device.

Vanessa West (01:46:52):

So there's a lot to, we couldn't just go and do it today. There would be work and money. It'd

Matt Ferkey (<u>01:46:57</u>):

Be easier at CenturyLink if we had a Century link, it would be so much easier. I actually have a cellular antenna. I have a wire to hook up a cellular antenna. I've been tempted to go grab the tank, monitor off the tank. It's fairly easy. Unlock the padlock, take it down, see if it works at the site with a good antenna. That's all I can do.

Vanessa West (01:47:19):

And in the meantime I'm going to wait and see how the congress people and the railroad and CenturyLink, how they can kind of get it worked out.

Matt Ferkey (01:47:27):

I got an extra modem right now. Our problem is we've had wired up there. We've had some sort of wired telecommunications for decades up there. It makes sense if it was buried this one and that was the problem was it wasn't buried. It was sitting on top of the, it was literally sitting touching the bottom of the rails and so when their equipment came by and cut it, that was that

Vanessa West (<u>01:47:56</u>):

We were really in their way. The lines are literally level with the tray. Yeah, it wasn't done. It's really ghetto. I dunno if that's a proper word. Yeah, it was not done. It should have been two feet under at least or three feet and then it should go. But no, it's really not good. I thought not taking a picture, but it was too embarrassing. We

Sharon Kelly (01:48:21):

Drilled a line underneath the rail line.

Vanessa West (01:48:25):

We can't do that. We need to pay millions of dollars to an engineer. The

Matt Ferkey (01:48:29):

Problem with that is if you drill a

Vanessa West (01:48:30):

Line,

Matt Ferkey (01:48:32):

If you drill a line under there and they say it caused damage to the railroad and they decide to come sue you for everything that happens, I understand that, but how would they know?

Vanessa West (01:48:48):

So the Lane County natural hazard mitigation plan that is we should be done in the next month or two. We've been meeting with them, a couple of different government agencies, people from the college, I don't know what we call which one it is. I don't know if it's the duck or the OSU,

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Jordan Walker (01:49:05):
University of Oregon.

Vanessa West (01:49:05):
So that's the Beaver state. The Beaver one? No, that's the duck. The duck ones. I get
Matt Ferkey (01:49:10):
Thought it was how

Vanessa West (01:49:14):
We cannot, they're both Oregon anymore.

Sharon Kelly (01:49:17):
Beaver?

Vanessa West (01:49:18):
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Well, I don't know. So I didn't know which one was coming. So the duck one, the Ducks University and a couple different government agencies and that's to get us annexed into Lane County's natural hazard mitigation plan. If we did not get annexed into their plan, which we got a grant to do it, I called him up and he was able to get the grant money from extra funding they had and since I went to one of the meetings, they approved it. So we got it. If we didn't, we'd have to do our own 200 page one by getting annexed. We're only adding an addendum to Lane County, so it's only going to be like 10 pages. So it's a lot easier quicker to get the 10 pages and then since this grant from someone else is paying for it, heck it's free and we didn't have to do anything besides having a few meetings with them and Sendal information.

Vanessa West (<u>01:50:05</u>):

They anticipate it should be done in a month or two and then it will have to go different people approve it and vote and this and that and I don't know. I think they got to come here and they will do something in front of the community to let the community to view it and then it will be approved. But what's so exciting about being annexed in the Lane County Emergency Management plan is that we can apply for FEMA funding. We could not apply for FEMA funding after last year was the last year you could without having this. So we will be able to apply for FEMA funding this year by having a natural hazard mitigation plan. And luckily our plan only has to be 18 or 20 pages instead of 200 by ourselves. So very exciting.

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Jordan Walker (01:50:50):

We got it sent to them. So Art did some entity, I don't know if you worked on that Vanessa West (01:50:55):

Too. Yeah, it's

Jordan Walker (01:50:58):
Submitted.

Vanessa West (01:50:59):
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Yeah, so it should be finalized in the next couple months. But they'll come here. They're going to come here to present it. We have another meeting next month. I mean next week. I didn't pay attention next week, but they're coming back next week for a final year before it's done.

ShirleyMarie Raven (01:51:15):

So presenting it here is that they have to open it up to public comment kind

Vanessa West (01:51:18):

Of thing. They want the community to come. So and we are working on getting the school and maybe the watershed and I think we've tried to get food share and a couple other, not food share, but the fire department we offer for them because they could get 18 pages in here too to be able to apply for it. So I do believe the schools took us off on it. So I do believe so they can write some grants also. So we've been meeting at the schools and letting us use their office. Each

ShirleyMarie Raven (01:51:47):

Organization has to be

Vanessa West (01:51:50):

Rolled

ShirleyMarie Raven (01:51:50):

Into this master plan.

Vanessa West (01:51:53):

Correct. Awesome. But Mapleton also, because we're already in there as an unincorporated area, but yeah, so each one has to be separate, but they can be unless we're working together. But yes, but the same group is going to do any, so I don't know. I think the watershed will be in it too. So next couple months then we'll be able to write Thema grant. So that's really exciting. Fantastic streetlight costs. That'd be Jordan

Jordan Walker (01:52:22):

0.9. So we had a raised street like these, I think two years and in that times to PDs increased our streetlight cost per month by 5% both of those years. Which is why I think it was Shirley Marie that noted that there was a discrepancy. I imagine they're going to be increasing again by 5%. I don't know for sure when usually they vote on it after June in the past and then it takes back the following month. So we don't, I won't know for sure until the end of June. What the exact, okay,

Vanessa West (01:53:01):

So this, but we already know we're in the negative.

Sharon Kelly (01:53:04):

Yes. So this should be a pass through, shouldn't it? It is,

Vanessa West (01:53:10):

Yes. It's supposed to be a pass through but it's costing us money.

Sharon Kelly (01:53:13):

Well if it's a pass through, it shouldn't cost us money.

Vanessa West (01:53:16):

Right, exactly. So we need to raise the rate so it doesn't cost us money.

Jordan Walker (01:53:20):

So if they increase the rate or increase the monthly fees that they charge us by 5%, we would need to break even to increase our streamline fee from 3 35 to 3 85. There's no way we can get out of that. No. Why can't the PPUD just build people on their bill?

Julie Doran-Lee (01:53:46):

Because they're not lights. You got to tell them to people's individual houses. Huh? They're not lights for people's individual houses.

Jordan Walker (<u>01:53:54</u>):

Well people get lights from 'em. It's true, but it's a separate electricity. Yeah. They also have a separate program to where instance the store I just called it about this. They have a separate century light which goes to the parking lot, which they are charge every month for which was in addition to paying the street light fee through us. But if street lights that go over the road, so it's a separate system. I don't know. I'm not sure what the legal certification is

Vanessa West (01:54:26):

For it, why they do it, but we don't have the capacity, the money to spend to try to investigate. It's a pass through.

Matt Ferkey (01:54:32):

What is the fee per

Vanessa West (01:54:33):

Profession right now? 50. We're going to raise it. 30 cents, 50 cents it

Matt Ferkey (01:54:39):

30. So you guys could probably just start on that and make it go up.

Vanessa West (01:54:43):

Yes. Well I think we got to wait a full month. We can bring it up and then I think before we can actually do it, we have to approve it next month.

Jordan Walker (01:54:49):

I think we have to do increase it by resolution, which requires

Vanessa West (01:54:55):

Certain when it's a rate we have to do a little bit more, but if it was just the monthly service team, we don't have to have that much, make sure that we accompany that with an explanation beforehand. If they want an explanation, they can come to the meeting.

Jordan Walker (01:55:12):

Well we need more information.

Julie Doran-Lee (01:55:17):

If they want to know what the 50 cents is before in the meeting, these are fees that the water district is required to pay and we've always done that by dividing it up amongst the customer. Yes,

Jordan Walker (01:55:28):

It would be good to have included the resolution, actual documentation from the POD or obligation to me because I asked them a couple of times for a public, it technically wasn't a public records request, it was just a request so he didn't have to respond to me. But in theory I could do a public records request

Vanessa West (01:55:53):

And that would be good. I mean if we can get out of it, I'd like to, but I just don't want to spend a bunch of money in a bunch of time in a bunch of resources and Laura fees. I

Jordan Walker (<u>01:56:00</u>):

Would be able to get out of it, but

Vanessa West (01:56:01):

At least improve. A lot of people don't believe that we are paying it. They think we're just pocketing that money. A lot of people like it. It doesn't make sense. Why would the water district be paying for street lights? It does not make sense.

Matt Ferkey (01:56:15):

It was a safety feature that our district said, Hey, let's make our town our community safer.

Vanessa West (<u>01:56:19</u>):

But it would be nice to show some sort of documentation because a lot of people, it does sound fishy and there's been a lot of fishy things going into the water district in all these years. Even recently. So I mean I have

Sharon Kelly (<u>01:56:30</u>):

A power pole right at the end of my driveway.

Vanessa West (01:56:32):

Well then you should be paying double.

Sharon Kelly (<u>01:56:35</u>):

No, I said where's my street

Vanessa West (<u>01:56:38</u>):

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Lights? I got one right on my corner of my house too.

Sharon Kelly (<u>01:56:41</u>):

Ignore me. You got one shining in the living. Yeah, I'm a long ways away from that, so I just wanted to bring that up.

Vanessa West (01:56:49):

So I think that some

Jordan Walker (01:56:52):

More research probably get more information. Like I said, we won't have a final cut out until the end of June. It would be one thing if they didn't bill anybody for anything, but they bill everybody for everything and they need to put that on their bill too. We can't fix that. We can.

Vanessa West (01:57:17):

Okay, so we're only going to bring it up now and then wait to see or and then

Jordan Walker (01:57:22):

It's basically to raise the issue that truly

Vanessa West (01:57:26):

Why we're going in the red for, well

ShirleyMarie Raven (01:57:29):

Since we've been behind it seems to me we could just go ahead and raise it anticipating they're going to have the 5% increase. If they don't, we would make up some of what we've already gone in the hole for. That's, so I would say go to the 3 85 now as soon as we can to start limiting our extra expenditure. We've been spending more than we've been receiving.

Vanessa West (01:57:57):

If the

Jordan Walker (<u>01:57:58</u>):

Board wants to do that, we can do that. It does make sense given that we're already,

Vanessa West (<u>01:58:02</u>):

It does make sense. My only thing is if we don't get money in this grant money, instead of having to get the loan, we're going to have to raise the rates and add a huge amount. So I don't want to raise them 50 cents in July and then raise them \$25 in August.

Jordan Walker (01:58:27):

It is. I can see where you're coming from, but it is a separate fee so it's

Vanessa West (<u>01:58:31</u>):

Itemized, but people will just see an increase as an increase and so that's my only problem is I just don't want, they're going to say you've increased it five times in the last, do you really think people

ShirleyMarie Raven (01:58:44):

Pay enough

Vanessa West (01:58:44):

Attention to this bill? Oh, 50 cents they're going to be completed, but the same amount as if we increase it \$25 and 50 cents.

Jordan Walker (01:58:52):

So that would be, I thought about that two rate, but that would be up to the board if they want to wait until the July meeting or do you want me to prepare something for original?

Julie Doran-Lee (01:59:05):

Well, but there's a possibility of us possibly getting out from under this.

ShirleyMarie Raven (01:59:10):

Oh no, there's not a

Vanessa West (01:59:12):

Possibility of, no, we're not getting out of electricity bill. No matter what the

Jordan Walker (01:59:16):

Lights, we don't know for sure if they're going to pass a rating.

Julie Doran-Lee (01:59:20):

Okay. Well I thought you said you were going to investigate. Ask them for where this agreement came from and

Jordan Walker (01:59:29):

Justification.

Julie Doran-Lee (01:59:30):

Okay, so we can send a letter. If there's no getting out of this agreement with them, then I think that we should just go ahead and raise it now anticipating that because don't you and then raise it again in two months. I don't know. Raise the other line item in two months. Are you going to have an answer on that grant in two months? I should have a better answer by July or August. What I do that, but our payment's going to be five or six grand a month. So you only

Matt Ferkey (01:59:59):

It's about a thousand dollars. Okay, so it's a thousand dollars and we're looking at four months. So a quarter, if we delay it for four months, you're looking at a quarter of that. So \$250. So it's going to cost you guys \$250 to wait four months to increase it. Is that rough? Yeah, it's going to cost the department \$250 to wait four months to do it and not upset all of their customers by raising the price twice

Julie Doran-Lee (02:00:28):

50 cents because we're going to have half the community that's going to come lynch us when we raise it \$25.

Matt Ferkey (<u>02:00:33</u>):

Yeah,

Vanessa West (02:00:34):

They're going to let us for the 50 cents just as much as they are, whatever it has to be. 15 or \$20.

Matt Ferkey (<u>02:00:40</u>):

Did you guys just raise the rates? Yeah,

Vanessa West (02:00:42):

We did. Just six months ago. Yeah, we did. And then now we want to raise it 50 cents and then now we want to raise, we might have to raise it 15 or I don't know what that dollar amount would be, but significant.

Jordan Walker (02:00:53):

Ideally given just the way the projects will get going on, the rate increases are going to be messed up anyways. Normally, obviously governance do an annual rate adjustment because we have so many uncertainty. Just

Julie Doran-Lee (<u>02:01:11</u>):

I know we've known for months for over a year that we are going to have to have a significant rate increase. That's why we raised it before get off to get answers on this to get answers on what it's going to cost to get the skid in to get the rate study done from RCAC. We've had all these things that we keep putting it off for so that we know so that we only have to raise it once. That's why we raised it like \$16. We know it's coming. I don't want to do it. Six, seven months ago

ShirleyMarie Raven (02:01:43):

I thought to do a rate increase, we had to have this big study and there had to be a lot stuff

Vanessa West (02:01:48):

Not to increase the monthly. So

ShirleyMarie Raven (02:01:50):

You're talking about increasing the monthly service fee? Not I

Vanessa West (02:01:54):

Like increasing the service fee because then we know exactly how much we're going to bring in because it's times by that we can't guess how much water everyone's going to use. So B, to be able to say yes, we can't afford an additional \$5,000 a month loans split between 250

ShirleyMarie Raven (02:02:09):

Bills. I just wanted clarification because you were saying rates and what I think amount per gallon, not service fee

Vanessa West (02:02:16):

I like the service fee idea because I want to make sure and know how much we're going to get each month. So I'd like to raise that instead of the rates. We did a very minor

ShirleyMarie Raven (02:02:27):

That's easier to do than raising the

Vanessa West (02:02:28):

Rates. Correct. And we did do a kind of, Jordan worked with a financial advisor at the bank for us to get pre-approved for this additional 800,000 loan. And he came with some pretty significant what he would like us to do to be able to make those additional payments.

Jordan Walker (02:02:45):

So in order to apply for the loan successfully, we had to do projections out five years and with certain assumptions in terms of increased costs for materials and personnel. And then they state also wanted to make sure that we had basically our contingency fund was a ratio of 1.21 for our annual loan payment. And assuming those figures were I projected a 15% increase this year or this upcoming year, 15% the following year and two 10% increases in our service fees. Correct. Okay.

Vanessa West (<u>02:03:34</u>):

Yeah. And I mean if we're going to do any rates, let's do it all at once. All at once is all I want to do. I want to do it all at once. Okay, we're going to have to raise rates. So I mean I would even vote for the 10 or 15% now. I mean we are going to have to raise rates. I just don't want to do a 50 cent rate increase. And then

Matt Ferkey (02:03:54):

I say even if you wait six months, it's costing you guys \$500 to wait,

Vanessa West (02:03:58):

But I don't think we're going to need to wait six months. I think we'll have a better idea how much we need to raise it because 60% of our population is either in poverty or barely above. I want to keep our rates as low as possible. So if we can get that 800,000 forgiven, we may only need to raise our rates \$2 each and 50 cents for this. I mean, and that's what would be ideal. I want to keep it as low as possible, but it's got to be realistic.

ShirleyMarie Raven (02:04:25):

You're waiting to get that 800,000 is going to become a grant rather than a loan. Okay, that makes sense. Okay, thank you.

Vanessa West (02:04:35):

In the meantime, it's cost us a bit of money, but I don't feel bad it costing us money that we could be getting that we aren't because really, I mean our community is, we're a rural distressed community and I want to keep our rates as low as we can and I've never seen a utility company raise the rates and never go

backwards. And if we ever did do that, I don't think any of the grant places would like us to raise them and then go backwards.

ShirleyMarie Raven (02:05:10):

They're going to say, why do you need money?

Vanessa West (02:05:13):

So I do want to have a little more information, but I do not want to have the whole entire town irate because of a 50 cent raise.

ShirleyMarie Raven (02:05:23):

Okay. Now that I understand that you're weighing to find out about the 800,000 becoming a grant rather than a loan, then it makes sense to me to wait on the 50 cents and then if we have to raise it, oh gosh, yes. Do both raises at once and explain

Vanessa West (02:05:42):

What's happening. That sounds good. Yep. Okay, good. So moving on, move it on. So is there anything for treasurer, do you have a report today?

Jordan Walker (<u>02:05:52</u>):

It's the financial statement.

Vanessa West (<u>02:05:54</u>):

Where's that at? Oh, treasurer. That's what the treasurer's report is. Okay. Only question I really have is, oh, I do want to mention

Vanessa West (02:06:28):

Our fee for our amazing accountant, buck Weld for years gave us the local deal and I don't think he raised the rate in the last 30 years. Did he retire? He retired. Retired. And so it wasn't just here, it was also for the fire department. I was on the budget committee there and stuff. She's charging us a fair market value for her services. She's not giving us the 1980s deal that Mike gave us that he hasn't increased it in the last 40 years. So that has gone up and she doesn't just do this and do the sit here for the budget. I mean she does so much work. Is

Sharon Kelly (02:07:09):

She taking Mike's place

Vanessa West (02:07:12):

Then? Mike sold her the business. So it's hers.

Matt Ferkey (02:07:15):

Alright.

Vanessa West (02:07:15):

And she's been working with him for the last several years from my understanding. So it's hers. So it's an increase. And she's increasing the ones here in Mapleton because they're nowhere near where they are supposed to be compared to the ones all the other businesses they do and nonprofits and such.

ShirleyMarie Raven (02:07:32):

So do you have a flat monthly fee that we're going to? It's going from 400 to 704 7. So if you look, they do itemize their invoices and I have noticed that we're getting a lot more than \$400 worth of services. Right. Regular prices. So it's

Vanessa West (02:07:51):

Four. And that's what I said when Mike told me they put together, they advertise our budget, they do this, they do that, they do. I cannot believe we at least contact 'em like 10 times a week. And they do all of our payroll and I mean they do all this and then they put together our budget, all this other paperwork for our audit and stuff. I mean I'm like, how can you do all this for \$400? We're basically going from 1980s rates and suddenly bumping up until, and we're not alone. The fire department, the same thing. Theirs went up because she's just charging just the real going fair, reasonable.

Jordan Walker (02:08:29):
